Governance

A. <u>First Reading: Board Policies/Regulations/Exhibits</u> (No Significant Changes)

Action

BP/AR 3110 Transfer of Funds

Delete AR. Add BP. Material formerly in regulation now incorporated into new policy. New policy reflects NEW LAWS (SBX3 4 and ABX4 2) which grant districts flexibility to transfer funds for "Tier 3" categorical programs and requires, as a condition of receipt of the funds, that the Board first hold a public hearing in order to hear testimony from the public, approve or disapprove the proposed use of the funding, and make explicit the purposes for which the funds will be used. Policy also contains language directing the Board to discuss the district's goals for student learning during the hearing and requiring the Superintendent to regularly report to the Board about the district's exercise of flexibility. Material formerly in regulation re: temporary transfers and loans and permanent transfers between funds shortened to reference law and incorporated into policy.

AR 3440 Inventories

Replace AR. Updated regulation clarifies state Categorical Program Monitoring criteria re: circumstances under which equipment purchased with state or federal categorical funds must be inventoried. Regulation also revised to more directly reflect law re: contents of the inventory, to add language on labeling and tracking of equipment, and to expand section on "Physical Inventory" to address procedures for physical inventory and investigation in the event a discrepancy is found.

BP/AR 3515.4 Recovery for Property Loss or Damage

Replace BP/AR. Policy contains updated note to reflect adjusted parent/guardian liability limits for misconduct of a minor child and for rewards paid by the district, as well as new Board goal language and revised options re: authority for the Superintendent to offer a reward. Revised regulation requires the Superintendent to conduct an investigation into of acts of vandalism or graffiti and to consult with the district's insurance administrator in the recovery of damages.

BP 4119.21/4219.21/4319.21 <u>Professional Standards</u>

Replace BP. Revised policy contains new section entitled "Staff Conduct with Students" which requires employees to maintain professional boundaries when interacting with students. Policy also prohibits inappropriate employee conduct, such as engaging in harassing behavior, engaging in inappropriate socialization or fraternization, or establishing an inappropriate written, verbal, or physical relationship with a student.

BP/AR 4154/4254/4354 Health and Welfare Benefits

Replace BP/AR. Policy and regulation updated to clarify the effect of state and federal laws on benefits for registered domestic partners and to reflect NEW FEDERAL LAW (American Recovery and Reinvestment Act) re: temporary subsidized premium for COBRA and Cal-COBRA for "assistance eligible individuals." Policy also clarifies the requirements for confidentiality of health records and expands the material on retired employees to include other individuals eligible under COBRA or Cal-COBRA. Regulation also revises section on "COBRA/Cal-COBRA Continuation Coverage" to more directly reflect law re: program eligibility based on reduction in hours of employment.

BP/AR 5121

Grades/Evaluation of Student Achievement

Replace BP/AR. Updated policy includes new optional language re: "progress reports" for grades K-3 and reflects NEW U.S. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION CORRESPONDENCE re: report cards and transcripts for students with disabilities. Policy also includes new language re: Superintendent's authority to determine the methodology to be used in calculating grade point average. MANDATED regulation updated to add paragraph on high school transcripts; revise section on "Grades for Achievement" to add grading systems for grades K-3 and for extra grade weighting for specified classes; expand section on "Grades for Physical Education" to address grades for interscholastic athletic participation; and add new sections on "Grades for College Courses" and "Grade Point Average."

BP 5131.5 Vandalism and Graffiti

Replace BP. Retitled policy contains new language directing the Superintendent to collaborate with local law enforcement and the city or county to develop vandalism and graffiti prevention strategies, to investigate certain incidents of vandalism or graffiti pursuant to the district's nondiscrimination policies, as appropriate, and to cover up graffiti as soon as possible.

BP/AR 5131.62 Tobacco

Replace BP/AR. Policy and regulation revised to reflect change in state's Tobacco-Use Prevention Education program to a competitive grant program for grades 6-12, effective July 1, 2009. Policy also (1) adds exception to student discipline for the possession or use of prescription tobacco products; (2) aligns tobacco-use prevention instruction with state standards; (3) clarifies that districts may make cessation/intervention services available by providing referrals; (4) expands section on "Program Planning" to add establishment of advisory council; and (5) adds new section on "Program Evaluation." Regulation revises material on cessation services to reflect CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION GUIDANCE re: priority for services. Regulation also clarifies the district's responsibility to identify high-risk student populations for purposes of targeting additional services and adds material, formerly in policy, re: services for pregnant and parenting students.

BP 5145.9 <u>Hate-Motivated Behavior</u>

Replace BP. Policy updated to explicitly prohibit discriminatory behavior or statements that degrade an individual on the basis of a protected category of discrimination and to provide for multi-agency collaborations to promote safe environments for youth. Policy also contains new section on "Grievance Procedures" and directs the Coordinator for Nondiscrimination/Principal to immediately investigate any complaint of hate-motivated behavior in accordance with the school-level grievance procedure specified in AR 5145.7 - Sexual Harassment.

BP 6011 Academic Standards

Replace BP. Policy updated to reflect all of the subject areas for which the State Board of Education or Superintendent of Public Instruction have now adopted model content standards. Policy also adds language on articulation of the standards between grade levels, professional development related to the standards, communication of the standards to students and parents/guardians, and reviewing and updating of the standards as necessary.

BP/AR 6116 Classroom Interruptions

<u>Delete</u> BP. <u>Replace</u> AR. Delete unnecessary policy. Regulation expanded to include additional strategies for reducing classroom interruptions, such as limiting the use of the intercom or public address system to announcements that apply to all students, scheduling deliveries to classrooms before or after school, addressing late arrival or early pick-up of students, limiting staff conduct of personal business during instructional time, and providing professional development on classroom management.

BP 6120 Response to Instruction and Intervention

Add BP. New optional policy reflects goal of the program to integrate instruction and resources in the general education program to improve achievement and to help close the achievement gap for all students. Policy reflects program strategies, based on NEW CDE CORRESPONDENCE, including creating a team to design the district's research-based, standards-based program and providing for the universal screening and monitoring of student progress.

BP 6141.6 Multicultural Education

<u>Delete</u> BP. Policy deleted and key concepts incorporated into BP 6142.94 - History-Social Science Instruction.

BP 6142.94 <u>History-Social Science Instruction</u>

Add BP. New policy reflects state standards and curriculum framework for historysocial science instruction, a multicultural education component, related instructional materials, professional development, and program evaluation.

B. <u>First Reading: Board Policies/Regulations/Exhibits</u> (Significant Changes)

Action

BP 3510 <u>Green School Operations</u>

Add BP. New optional policy expresses the Board's intent to integrate green school practices into district operations to conserve natural resources and contribute to healthy school environments. Policy includes sample strategies (e.g., environmentally preferable purchasing, green cleaning, sustainable building practices) and links to other related policies and regulations.

BP 5021 <u>Noncustodial Parents</u>

Replace BP. Revised policy contains new language clarifying that the parent who enrolls a child is presumed to be the parent with custody and that, unless the district receives a copy of a certified court order restricting access, both parents are presumed to have equal rights regarding their child, including picking the student up after school or otherwise removing the student from school, accessing student records, participating in school activities, or visiting the school.

BP/AR 5141.52 Suicide Prevention

Replace BP/AR. Optional policy expanded to add language on collaboration in planning, implementation, and evaluation of suicide prevention and intervention strategies; the role of positive school climate in suicide prevention; alignment of related instruction with state standards; and additional topics for parent information and staff development. Updated, optional regulation expands the section entitled "Instruction" to include the identification of additional resources to help troubled students. "Intervention" section expanded to include steps to be taken in the event of a suicide threat or attempt, including new language re: district actions in the aftermath of a suicide or attempted suicide.

Add BP/AR. Budget Committee Meeting Update

The budget committee met on October 13th to begin the difficult process of planning for budget cuts for the 2010/11 school year. The budget shortfall is currently estimated at \$1.8 million.

The meeting was attended by 12 employees that came from the District Office, elementary, middle and high school sites. This meeting was a "brainstorming" introduction that will be followed by our November 3rd and December 8th meetings. We will next review the "Parking Lot" list from last year and evaluate all ideas for savings and feasibility.

CONSULTANT SERVICES AGREEMENT

This Consultant Services Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into by and between Vision Service Plan, a California not-for-profit corporation ("VSP"), and Center Unified School District ("Client"), with regard to VSP's provision of certain human resources consulting services to, for, or on behalf of, Client, (the "Services"), on the following basis:

1. The Services; Provision of Client's Data. In consideration for, and subject to, the mutual undertakings set forth herein, VSP agrees to provide certain Services to Client, the scope of which Client has requested, as well as the time frames and deliverables VSP is anticipated to produce, and various other details of the Services to be provided hereunder are more particularly described in Exhibit A attached and incorporated herein. It is acknowledged and understood by the parties that the description of the Services set forth in Exhibit A, including the timeframes for performance and delivery, represent good faith estimates and assume that Client will take or provide whatever actions may be necessary on its own part to support and facilitate the provision of the Services.

The Services to be provided by VSP may require Client to deliver to VSP certain data, documents and/or other necessary information, all in a timely and in an accurate manner. VSP will have no obligation to test or otherwise verify the accuracy or completeness of any such data, documents or other information received, and VSP will not be responsible for any errors or omissions contained therein or for the modification and/or correction of such errors and/or omissions. VSP shall be fully protected in relying upon the accuracy and/or veracity of all data, documents and information supplied by Client, or by Client's agents, and shall have no responsibility or liability for any errors, delays or additional costs resulting from the receipt of incomplete, inaccurate or untimely information or data, or information or data provided in an unacceptable manner, format or media from Client or Client's agents.

- 2. <u>Term and Termination</u>. The [term OR initial term] of this Agreement will be as follows: contract term beginning on July 22, 2009 and concluding on December 31, 2011. This Agreement may be terminated by Client upon a material breach of the Agreement by VSP that is not cured within ten (10) business days following its receipt of written notice of such breach. This Agreement may also be terminated by VSP upon a material breach of the Agreement by Client, including without limitation, failure to pay any and all fees and expenses when due, which is not cured within ten (10) business days following its receipt of written notice of such breach.
- 3. <u>Fees and Expenses, Invoicing and Payment.</u> For and during the term(s) of this Agreement, Client will pay and deliver to VSP the retainer, fees and expenses as set forth on **Exhibit B** attached and incorporated herein ("Schedule of Fees and Expenses").
- 4. <u>Independent Contractor; Service Provider; Fiduciary Status.</u> Nothing in this Agreement is intended, or shall be construed, to give VSP discretionary authority or responsibility in the management of/over Client's business or operations. The relationship of VSP, including that of its directors, officers, and/or employees, to Client, including that to its directors, officers, and/or employees, is intended to and shall only be that of an independent contractor and service provider, and not that of employee, partner, joint venturer, agent, fiduciary and/or other similar relationship for any purpose whatsoever.
- 5. <u>Limited Warranty.</u> VSP warrants to Client that the Services performed under this Agreement will be performed in accordance with and limited to generally accepted industry standards. EXCEPT FOR THIS EXPRESS LIMITED WARRANTY, VSP MAKES NO REPRESENTATIONS OR WARRANTIES, EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, STATUTORY OR OTHERWISE, WITH RESPECT TO

THE SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED UNDER THIS AGREEMENT. ANY POTENTIAL WARRANTY CLAIMS SHALL BE MADE WITHIN ONE (1) YEAR FROM THE DATE THE ALLEGED FAULT OR ERROR WAS MADE OR SHALL BE FOREVER BARRED.

6. <u>Limitation on Liability.</u> VSP and Client agree that the potential liability of VSP to Client under this Agreement will be limited to direct losses actually suffered by Client, as the result of VSP's actual fraud or willful misconduct in the performance of the Services provided and for breach of the limited warranty set forth in this Agreement. The amount of such potential liability, however, shall not exceed the amount of the initial fee paid to VSP under this Agreement. VSP will not be responsible to Client for VSP's (i) failure to perform any Services other than those set forth in this Agreement, (ii) actions or inactions based on instructions or directions from Client, including its agents, and/or (iii) failure to provide the Services listed on Exhibit A primarily because of (a) any error or omission in and/or lack of timely submission of the data, documents and/or information provided by, or on behalf of, Client, and/or (b) any event of force majeure as set forth herein.

NOTWITHSTANDING ANYTHING TO THE CONTRARY CONTAINED IN THIS AGREEMENT, IN NO EVENT WILL VSP BE LIABLE TO CLIENT, THE PLAN ADMINISTRATOR (IF APPLICABLE), TO THE PLAN (IF APPLICABLE) AND/OR TO ANY BENEFICIARY OF THE SERVICES HEREUNDER, FOR ANY INDIRECT, INCIDENTAL, EXEMPLARY, SPECIAL, PUNITIVE OR CONSEQUENTIAL DAMAGES (INCLUDING, WITHOUT LIMITATION, DAMAGES RELATING TO LOSS OF PROFITS, INCOME, GOODWILL OR DATA) ARISING OUT OF ANY PERFORMANCE OR NON-PERFORMANCE HEREUNDER WITHOUT REGARD TO LEGAL THEORY OF/FOR SUCH DAMAGES, WHETHER SUCH DAMAGES ARE BASED UPON BREACH OF CONTRACT, BREACH OF WARRANTY, INDEMNITY, NEGLIGENCE, GROSS NEGLIGENCE, STRICT LIABILITY OR OTHERWISE.

- 7. Indemnity Against Claims. Client agrees to indemnify and hold harmless VSP, including its affiliates and subsidiaries, as well as its/their directors, officers, employees, and agents, from and against any and all liabilities, damages, settlements, costs, and expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and expert witness fees) arising out of, or related to, any and all claims, lawsuits or proceedings of any kind and/or nature whatsoever made or brought against VSP, including its affiliates and subsidiaries, as well as its/their directors, officers, employees or agents, by any third party, including, but not limited to, any applicable Plan, Plan Administrator or third party beneficiary claiming rights hereunder, arising out of, or related to, VSP's Services provided or to be provided under this Agreement. - 8. <u>Dispute Resolution; Arbitration.</u> In the event of a claimed breach of this Agreement, or a dispute as to the meaning of this Agreement, or any of its terms which the parties cannot resolve by themselves amicably through direct discussions, the parties agree to submit any such dispute to resolution as set forth herein. The parties shall endeavor to resolve the dispute through the use of non-binding mediation, to which each party shall bear its own costs and shall be responsible to share equally (1/2) in the cost of the mediator. If within ninety (90) days after one party notifies the other in writing of the existence of a claimed dispute and the relief requested which it desires to be resolved by mediation, and the dispute is not resolved through such mediation, then the dispute shall be resolved by final and binding arbitration in accordance with the Commercial Arbitration Rules of the American Arbitration Association ("AAA").

In the absence of agreement on an arbitrator, the arbitrator shall be selected through the rules and procedures of the governing alternative dispute resolution association referenced above. A hearing by the arbitrator shall be held within sixty (60) business days of the arbitrator's appointment, and a decision and resolution must be reached within sixty (60) days of the arbitration hearing. No discovery will be permitted in connection with the arbitration unless it is expressly authorized by the arbitrator upon a showing of substantial need by the party seeking discovery.

Judgment upon the arbitration award may be entered in any court having jurisdiction. All mediation or arbitration hearings shall be held in Sacramento County, California, and all aspects and information of the mediation and/or arbitration shall be treated as confidential for all purposes. Each party shall bear its own cost of presenting its case in arbitration, including one-half (1/2) the cost(s) of the arbitrator. The reasoned decision(s) of the arbitrator shall be in writing and will be final and binding on the parties.

- 9. Force Majeure. 

SUBJECT: Agreement between Child Development Centers and Center

Unified School District

The district is requesting approval for a one year contract with Child Development Centers to provide day care for students at North Country, Arthur S. Dudley, and Cyril Spinelli Elementary Schools. The agreement is for July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2010.

RECOMMENDATION: That the Board of Trustees approve the one year agreement between Child Development Centers and Center Unified School District for day care services.

AGREEMENT FOR PARTICIPATION IN THE CENTER UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT'S SCHOOL-AGE CHILD CARE SERVICES

This agreement is entered into this first of July, 2009 by and between the Center Unified School District, (hereinafter referred to as the "District") and Child Development Centers, a California nonprofit corporation, (hereinafter referred to as the "Child Care Provider").

RECITALS

- 1.1 District is a local educational agency contracting with the state under agreements as described in General Child Care Funding Terms and Conditions.
- 1.2 Child Care Provider is a private agency, staffed, prepared, and capable of providing child care services as defined in Section 3 of this agreement.
- 1.3 District wishes to delegate operating responsibility to Child Care Provider for child care services authorized by contracts with the California Department of Education (hereinafter "State"), as the most cost-efficient means of providing these services at any of the following locations:

Bannon Creek School Age CDC 2775 Millcreek Drive Sacramento, CA 95833

Arthur Dudley School Age CDC 8000 Aztec Way Antelope, CA 95843 North Country School Age CDC 3901 Little Rock Drive Antelope, CA 95843

Cyril Spinelli School Age CDC 3401 Scotland Drive Antelope, CA 95843

TERM

2.1 This Agreement shall commence not earlier than July 1, 2009, and shall terminate, unless terminated earlier pursuant to the terms of this agreement, no later than June 30, 2010.

SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED BY CHILD CARE PROVIDER

- 3.1 Child Care Provider agrees to provide child care services as defined and outlined in the approved application, budget, and contracts between District and State. Services to be provided by Child Care Provider include, but are not limited to, academic support activities, creative arts activities, recreational activities, and daily interaction with parents as set forth in the District's application.
- 3.2 Child Care Provider agrees to provide adequate child days of certified enrollment (supported by at least 95% attendance) to earn a portion of the Maximum Reimbursable Amount (less District indirect charges) of the contract as described in Attachment A.
- 3.3 Child Care Provider further agrees to earn subsidized parent fees or interest income by serving an appropriate number of additional subsidized children and incurring additional reimbursable costs equivalent to the amount of subsidized parent fees collected and/or interest income.
- 3.4 Child Care Provider shall maintain participation in the Child Care Food Program throughout the term of this Agreement.
- 3.5 Child Care Provider shall be responsible for hiring qualified staff and for maintaining required ratios in accordance with licensing and State requirements.
- 3.6 Child Care Provider shall be responsible for seeing that all sites used pursuant to this Agreement shall meet all necessary licensing requirements.

ADMINISTRATION

- 4.1 Child Care Provider shall administer the program in accordance with the rules, regulations, and policies of District and State, including those stated in the "general assurances" form submitted with District's contracts with State and attached hereto.
- 4.2 All activities authorized by this agreement to be performed by Child Care Provider shall be performed within the approved program policies, the approved budget, the contract funding, the terms and conditions, and appropriate Child Development Division, California Department of Education Directives, in accordance with the applications and contracts between District and State attached hereto.
- 4.3 Child Care Provider shall comply with all applicable laws, ordinances, and codes of the federal, state, and local governments.
- 4.4 Child Care Provider shall require that all Child Care Provider personnel who are authorized to sign checks be bonded in an amount which will cover the total amount under the control of the Child Care Provider at any one time. Child Care Provider shall provide to the District a certificate of insurance verifying the Child Care Provider fidelity bond coverage. Said certificate of insurance shall not be canceled without thirty days prior written notice to District.

REPORTS AND RECORDS

- 5.1 Child Care Provider shall maintain and provide to District records for program review, evaluations, audit, and/or other purposes. Records maintained or provided pursuant to this section shall be made available to the agents of State upon request of District or State. Such records shall be maintained for a minimum of five (5) years.
- 5.2 Child Care Provider agrees to submit to the District such reports as required by State directives or by the District.
- 5.3 Child Care Provider shall report all expenditures in accordance with California School District Accounting Manual Procedures.
- 5.4 Child Care provider shall provide an annual line-item budget by expenditure category for approval by State and District. All revenues and expenses shall be identified in separate accounts.
- 5.5 Child Care Provider will close its accounting and attendance records on the last day of each month for preparation of the required monthly statement. Monthly reports of enrollment, attendance, and expenditures shall be submitted to the District no later than the 16th day of each month.
- 5.6 Child Care Provider records shall be subject to the same audit and/or audit review requirements as imposed on District through its contracts with State. In any event, Child Care Provider shall provide to District an annual audit in accordance with State audit guidelines.
- 5.7 Child Care Provider shall be liable for any audit exception caused by or as a result of Child Care Provider's lack of performance as required by this Agreement.
- 5.8 Child Care Provider, in its discretion, may purchase necessary equipment or supplies to the extent such purchase may be reimbursed from State funds. Any unit of equipment purchased pursuant to this Agreement costing over \$7,500, and/or having a useful life expectancy of two years or more, shall have prior written authorization from District and State. Title to any equipment or supplies so purchased shall vest in Child Care Provider for the term of this Agreement. Insurance on all property purchased pursuant hereto shall be provided by Child Care Provider. Upon termination of this Agreement, title to all equipment and remaining supplies purchased pursuant hereto shall revert to District.

DISTRICT RESPONSIBILITIES

- 6.1 District shall monitor, evaluate, and provide technical assistance to Child Care Provider regarding the conduct of activities delegated or required under this Agreement.
- 6.2 District shall compensate Child Care Provider monthly, based upon units of enrollment and attendance. Such compensation by the District to Child Care Provider shall be made only upon receipt of records certifying units of enrollment and attendance.
- 6.3 District agrees to reimburse Child Care Provider for authorized expenditures subject to receipt of funds from State.

- 6.4 District shall compensate Child Care Provider for travel and per diem expenses necessitated by this Agreement. Such travel and per diem expenses will be reimbursed only at rates not exceeding those amounts paid to the majority of the State Department of Education's represented employees computed in accordance with Department of Personnel Administration Regulations, Title 2 California Code of Regulations, Subchapter 1.
- 6.5 District agrees that it is solely responsible to the State for fulfillment of its contracts with the State and for compliance with all terms and conditions contained within, or attached to, the contracts for the current fiscal year.

INDEMNIFICATION

- 7.1 Child Care Provider shall indemnify, defend, and save harmless the State of California, its officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims and losses occurring or resulting to any and all contractors, subcontractors, suppliers, laborers, or any other person, firm, or corporation furnishing or supplying work, services, materials, or supplies in connection with the performance of this Agreement, and from any and all claims and losses occurring or resulting to any person, firm, or corporation that may be injured or damaged by the Child Care provider in the performance of this Agreement.
- 7.2 Child Care Provider shall agree to indemnify, defend, and save harmless the District, its officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims and losses occurring or resulting to any and all contractors, subcontractors, suppliers, laborers, and any other person, firm, or corporation furnishing or supplying work, services, materials, or supplies in connection with the performance of the subcontract, and from any and all claims and losses occurring or resulting to any person, firm, or corporation that may be injured or damaged by Child Care Provider in the performance of this Agreement.
- 7.3 Child Care provider will hold District harmless for any contract obligations entered into that cannot be met due to the non-receipt of funds.

INSURANCE

- 8.1 Child Care Provider shall provide and maintain fidelity bond coverage as evidenced by a certificate of insurance as described under section 4.4.
- 8.2 Child Care Provider shall provide and shall maintain in force during the term of this contract, comprehensive bodily injury and property damage liability insurance with a combined single limit of \$1,000,000. Child Care Provider's policy or policies of liability insurance obtained pursuant to this Agreement shall name District and State as additional insureds under the terms of such policy or policies. No such policy may be canceled without 30 days prior written notice to the District.
- 8.3 Child Care Provider shall provide workers' compensation insurance, unemployment insurance, and disability insurance for all of its employees, as required by law.
- 8.4 Certificates for all types of insurance required under this Agreement shall be furnished to District within two weeks of the commencement date of this Agreement. All certificates provided pursuant to this section shall indicate the name of the carrier, the policy number, and the expiration date.

TERMINATION

- 9.1 District may terminate this Agreement and be relieved of the payment of any consideration to the Child Care Provider upon failure by Child Care Provider to perform any of the terms of this Agreement including, but not limited to:
 - a. Failure, for any reason, of Child Care Provider to fulfill in a timely and proper manner its obligations under this contract, including compliance with the approved program and attached conditions, and such statutes, executive orders, and State directives as may become generally applicable at any time;
 - b. Submission by Child Care Provider to District of reports, accountings, records, or audits which are incorrect or incomplete in any material respect;
 - c. Ineffective or improper use of funds provided under this contract.
- 9.2 In the event that this Agreement is terminated in whole or in part by District for any reason pursuant to section 9.1, 30 days written notice shall be provided to Child Care Provider.
- 9.3 Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, District shall be authorized to terminate this Agreement without prior notice, written or oral, should the California Department of Education terminate its contract with District or District, in its discretion, determine that an emergency condition exists.
- 9.4 Child Care Provider may terminate this Agreement by giving 90 days prior written notice to District, signifying the effective date thereof.
- 9.5 In the event that District is required to assign or transfer this contract pursuant to any section of this Agreement, District may require Child Care provider to insure that adequate arrangements have been made for the transfer of the delegated activities to another contractor or to District.
- 9.6 In the event of any termination, all property and finished or unfinished documents, data, studies, and reports purchased or prepared by Child Care Provider under this contract shall be disposed of according to District and State directives.
- 9.7 In the event of termination pursuant to the terms of this Agreement, Child Care Provider shall be entitled to compensation for any unreimbursed expenses reasonably and necessarily incurred in satisfactory performance of this Agreement.
- 9.8 Notwithstanding section 9.7 above, Child Care Provider shall not be relieved of liability to the District for damages sustained by District by virtue of any breach of the contract by Child Care Provider, and District may withhold any such reimbursement to Child Care Provider for the purpose of offset until such time as the exact amount of damages due to District from Child Care Provider is agreed upon or otherwise determined.
- 9.9 Upon termination of this Agreement for any reason, consideration paid to Child Care Provider, as provided in this Agreement, shall be full compensation for all of Child Care Provider's expenses incurred in the performance of this agreement.

NONDISCRIMINATION

- 10.1 During the performance of this Agreement, the District, Child Care Provider, and its subcontractors shall not deny the Agreement's benefits to any person on the basis of religion, color, ethnic group identification, sex, age, physical or mental disability, nor shall they discriminate unlawfully against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, physical handicap, mental disability, medical condition, marital status, age, or sex.
- 10.2 Child Care Provider and District shall comply with the provisions of the Fair Employment and Housing Act (Government Code, Section 12900 et seq.), the regulations promulgated thereunder (California Code of Regulations, Title 2, Section 7285.0 et seq.), the provisions of Article 9.5, Chapter 1, Part 1, Division 3, Title 2 of the Government Code (Government Code, Sections 11135-11139.5) and the regulations or standards adopted by the awarding State agency to implement such article.
- 10.3 Child Care Provider or District shall permit access by representatives of the Department of Fair Employment and Housing and the awarding State agency upon reasonable notice at any time during the normal business hours, but in no case less than 24 hours notice, to such of its books, records, accounts, other sources of information and its facilities as said Department or Agency shall require to ascertain compliance with this clause.
- 10.4 District, Child Care Provider, and their subcontractors shall give written notice of their obligations under this clause to labor organizations with which they have a collective bargaining or other agreement.
- 10.5 Child Care Provider shall include the nondiscrimination and compliance provisions of this clause in all subcontracts to perform work under the contract.

GENERAL CONDITIONS

- 11.1 Child Care Provider, and the agents and employees of Child Care Provider, in the performance of this Agreement, are acting in an independent capacity and not as officers, employees, or agents of the State of California.
- 11.2 Child Care Provider, its agents and employees, in the performance of this Agreement, are acting in an independent capacity and not as agents or employees of District.
- 11.3 Child Care Provider, by signing this Agreement, swears under penalty of perjury that no more than one final unappealable finding of contempt of court has been issued by a federal court against Child Care Provider within the last two years because of failure to comply with an order of the National Labor Relations Board.
- 11.4 Pursuant to sections 11.1 and 11.2, the status of the Child Care Provider under this Agreement shall be, at all times during the term of this Agreement, that of an independent contractor and at no time shall Child Care Provider (or agents and/or employees of Child Care Provider) represent itself to be, officers, employees, or agents of the District or of the State of California.

- 11.5 No alteration or variation of the terms of this Agreement shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by Child Care Provider and District excepting a change in reimbursement rate due to a COLA. No oral understanding or agreement not incorporated into this Agreement shall be binding on either party. Amendments to this Agreement may be subject to the approval of the State Department of Education.
- 11.6 In the event that a dispute arises over the terms, language, or interpretation of this Agreement, and such dispute is submitted to a court of competent jurisdiction, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover reasonable attorneys' fees in addition to any other relief awarded by the court.
- 11.7 The rights and remedies granted in this Agreement in the event of default are cumulative and the exercise of those rights and remedies shall be without prejudice to the enforcement of any other violation or breach of this Agreement, and forbearance to enforce one or more of the provisions of this agreement should not be construed to be a waiver of that default or breach.
- 11.8 If any part of this Agreement is declared invalid for any reason, such declaration shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this Agreement. All other parts of the Agreement shall remain in effect as if the Agreement had been executed without the invalid part. Both parties hereby declare that they intend and desire that the remaining parts of the Agreement continue to be effective without any part or parts that have been declared invalid.
- 11.9 The captions of the sections of this Agreement are for reference only and are not to be construed in any way as a part of this Agreement.
- 11.10 This Agreement is not assignable by Child Care Provider, either in whole or in part, without prior written consent of the District and the State.
- 11.11 This Agreement is the complete and exclusive statement of the mutual understanding of the parties and that the subcontract supersedes and cancels all previous written and oral agreements and communications relating to the subject matter of the subcontract.
 - 11.12 Time is the essence of this Agreement.



BP 3110(a)

TRANSFER OF FUNDS

Note: The following board policy is optional.

The Governing Board recognizes its responsibility to monitor the district's fiscal practices to ensure accountability regarding the expenditure of public funds and compliance with legal requirements.

(cf. 3100 - Budget)
(cf. 3400 - Management of District Assets/Accounts)

Note: Education Code 42600 specifies that the total amount budgeted by the district for each major classification of expenditures, as listed in the California Department of Education's (CDE) budget forms, shall be the maximum amount which the district may expend for that classification for the school year. However, the Governing Board may adopt a resolution authorizing (1) a transfer from the designated fund balance or the unappropriated fund balance to any expenditure classification or between classifications (Education Code 42600); (2) a temporary loan between funds (Education Code 42603); or (3) an end-of-year transfer to allow the payment of obligations (Education Code 42601). In some cases, the transfer must be approved by the County Superintendent of Schools.

The Board may also adopt a resolution to authorize the permanent transfer of monies between certain funds, including to the special reserve fund from the general fund (Education Code 42841), to the general fund from the special reserve fund (Education Code 42842-42843), to the deferred maintenance fund from the general fund (Education Code 17582-17592), and to the state school building lease-purchase fund from all other district funds (Education Code 16095). Pursuant to Education Code 52616.4, districts are authorized to spend adult education funds only for direct instructional charges and direct support charges of adult education programs and specific methods are required for the transfer of funds for these costs.

The Board may transfer funds during or at the end of the fiscal year in accordance with law as necessary to meet district needs or to permit the payment of district obligations. (Education Code 16095, 17582-17592, 42600-42603, 42605, 42841-42843, 52616.4)

Tier 3 Categorical Flexibility

Note: As added and amended by SBX3 4 (Ch. 12, Statutes of 2009) and ABX4 2 (Ch. 2, Statutes of 2009), the 2009-10 budget trailer bills, Education Code 42605 grants districts flexibility to transfer funds received for 39 "Tier 3" categorical programs for any "educational purpose" for the 2008-09 through the 2012-13 fiscal years.

As a condition of receipt of the categorical funds, Education Code 42605 requires the Board to first hold a public hearing in order to take testimony from the public and to discuss and approve or disapprove the proposed use of the funding. ABX4 2, signed by the Governor on July 28, 2009, further amended Education Code 42605 to require the Board to make explicit for each categorical budget item the purposes for which the funds will be used and to require the district to report expenditure of the funds to the CDE using the Standardized Account Code Structure.

TRANSFER OF FUNDS (continued)

According to the CDE, the required hearing is merely a condition for the receipt of funds in the future and not a condition of the transformation of the funds to unrestricted status or of the ability of the district to transfer funds from one use to another. The hearing may be part of the district's regular budget hearing process or a separate hearing. In either case, the hearing should be a separate agenda item. Although the law does not require that the hearing to be held annually, CSBA recommends an annual hearing in order to ensure compliance with accounting procedures. For further information about the public hearing and the categorical programs affected, as well as a sample resolution, see CSBA's Budget Advisory, Flexibility Provisions in the 2008 and 2009 State Budget: Policy Considerations for Governance Teams.

The following section is optional and should be modified to reflect district practice. Districts that have not accepted this flexibility should delete this section.

From the 2008-09 through 2012-13 fiscal years, the Board has determined that it is in the best interest of the district to utilize the categorical program flexibility authorized by Education Code 42605. Funds received for programs identified by law as Tier 3 categoricals may be expended for any educational purpose.

The Board shall hold a public hearing to take testimony from the public, discuss, and approve or disapprove the proposed use of the funding, and shall make explicit for each of the categorical budget items the purposes for which the funds will be used. (Education Code 42605)

Note: The following paragraph is **optional**. Education Code 42605, as added by SBX3 4 (Ch. 12, Statutes of 2009) and amended by ABX4 2 (Ch. 2, Statutes of 2009), specifies that districts accepting flexibility shall be deemed in compliance with the program and funding requirements contained in state law or regulation for each of the Tier 3 categorical programs. Therefore, aside from the exceptions specified in Education Code 42605(e), the funds are unrestricted and districts have discretion whether to follow legal requirements for those programs during the period of flexibility. According to the CDE, restrictions associated with the funding (e.g., expenditure reports or compliance reviews) no longer exist. See CSBA's Budget Advisory for further information regarding the programs affected and exceptions.

During the hearing, the Board shall consider the district's goals for student learning and determine funding priorities and program focus. The Board may also discuss statutory constraints, available resources, and whether program modifications might improve educational outcomes.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly report to the Board regarding how the district is exercising the flexibility and whether the desired results are being achieved. He/she shall also complete any necessary reports required by the California Department of Education.

Transfer of Funds between Categories; Amendments

BP 3110

Business and Noninstructional Operations

Transfers may be made from the undistributed reserve to any expenditure classification at any time by the Governing Board by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote when it is approved by the County Superintendent of Schools. Transfers may be made at any time between expenditure classifications by a majority vote of the members of the Board when it is approved by the County Superintendent of Schools.

At the close of the school year the County Superintendent may, with the consent of the Board previously given, make transfers between the undistributed reserve and any expenditure classification or classifications or balance any expenditure classifications of the budget as are necessary to permit the payment of obligations of the district incurred during the school year.

The Board may by written resolution and majority vote transfer funds between expenditure classifications.

Temporary Transfers between Classifications

The Board may direct that monies held in any fund or account may be temporarily transferred from one or more of these accounts to another fund to be used for the payment of obligations of the district, with limitations as set by Education Code 42603.

Transfers may be made from the designated fund balance or the unappropriated fund balance to any expenditure classification or between expenditure classifications by the Governing Board on adoption of a resolution by a majority vote. The resolution must be approved by the County Superintendent of Schools and filed with the county auditor. (Education Code 42600)

End-of-the-Year Procedures

At the close of the school year, the Superintendent or designee may, with Board approval, identify and request the County Superintendent of Schools to make transfers between the designated fund balance or the unappropriated fund balance and any expenditure classification(s) or balance any budget expenditure classifications as necessary to permit the payment of obligations incurred by the district during that school year. (Education Code 42601)

Temporary Transfers between Classifications

The Board may direct that monies held in any fund or account may be temporarily transferred from one or more of these accounts to another fund or account to be used for the payment of obligations of the district, with limitations as set by Education Code 42603. The transfer shall be accounted for as temporary borrowing and shall not be available for appropriation or be considered income to the borrowing fund or account.

Special Reserve Funds

Any money in a special reserve fund that is maintained for purposes other than capital outlay must be transferred into the district's general fund before it is expended. (Education Code 42842)

INVENTORIES

Note: Education Code 35168 requires the Governing Board to establish and maintain an inventory of all items of equipment with a current market value above \$500, as provided in item #1 below. Generally, the Board delegates this authority to the Superintendent or designee.

For equipment purchased with federal funds, unless the program is specifically exempted, 34 CFR 80.3 and 80.32 require districts to maintain inventory records of "tangible, nonexpendable, personal property having a useful life of more than one year and an acquisition cost of \$5,000 or more per unit." However, in the state's Categorical Program Monitoring (CPM) process, the California Department of Education (CDE) reviews whether the district maintains an inventory record for each item of equipment with an acquisition cost of \$500 or more per unit that is purchased with state and/or federal categorical funds. Thus, it is recommended that districts maintain inventories of equipment with an acquisition cost of \$500 or more per unit, as provided in item #2 below.

The district may specify lower amounts for items #1 and #2 below.

Note that the acquisition cost threshold amount established for the equipment inventory need not be the same as the threshold amount established for identifying capital assets for accounting purposes; see BP 3400 - Management of District Assets/Accounts. As explained in the CDE's <u>California School Accounting Manual</u>, all capitalized items should be inventoried, but not all inventoried items should be capitalized.

In order to provide for the proper tracking and control of district property, the Superintendent or designee shall maintain an inventory of equipment in accordance with law for the following:

- 1. All equipment items currently valued in excess of \$500 (Education Code 35168)
- 2. All equipment items purchased with state and/or federal categorical funds that have a useful life of more than one year with an acquisition cost of \$500 or more per unit

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(cf. 3290 - Gifts, Grants and Bequests)
(cf. 3400 - Management of District Assets/Accounts)
(cf. 3512 - Equipment)
```

Note: The following optional paragraph may be revised to reflect district practice. According to the <u>California School Accounting Manual</u>, some districts choose to inventory certain items, such as computers, audiovisual equipment, and furniture, even if their cost is lower than the threshold defined by law.

In addition, the Superintendent or designee may maintain a list of specific items which shall be inventoried for internal control purposes regardless of their initial cost or current value.

The inventory shall contain a record of the following information: (Education Code 35168; 5 CCR 3946)

INVENTORIES (continued)

- 1. Name and description of the property
- 2. Identification number
- 3. Original cost of the item of equipment or a reasonable estimate if the original cost is unknown
- 4. Date of acquisition
- 5. Location of use
- 6. The date and method of disposal

(cf. 3270 - Sale and Disposal of Books, Equipment and Supplies)

Note: Items #1-5 below are for use by districts that have used state and/or federal categorical funds to purchase equipment with an initial cost over the threshold established by law or the district. The district may merge this list into the list above in order to provide consistent procedures for all district equipment.

In addition to the information specified in items #1-6 above, the following information shall be recorded for equipment acquired with state and/or federal categorical funds unless otherwise specified in law: (34 CFR 80.32; 5 CCR 3946)

- 1. Source of the property (funding source)
- 2. Titleholder
- 3. Percentage of federal participation in the cost of the property
- 4. Use and condition of property
- 5. Sale price of the property upon disposition and method used to determine current fair market value

At the time of purchase, the Superintendent or designee shall affix a label to the equipment containing the identification number and the district name. Equipment items purchased with categorical program funds shall also be labeled with the name of the project in accordance with 5 CCR 3946.

Note: The following optional paragraph provides for tracking of items that are moved from their original location. For additional requirements regarding safeguards for equipment purchased with categorical program funds, see AR 3512 - Equipment.

INVENTORIES (continued)

Whenever an equipment item is moved to a new location or the equipment is used for a new purpose, the new location or purpose shall be recorded in the inventory.

Note: 5 CCR 3946 requires that the inventory of equipment purchased with state and/or federal categorical funds be maintained at the district office and appropriate school site. The following optional paragraph has been expanded to apply to all inventories conducted by the district and may be revised to reflect district practice.

A copy of the inventory shall be kept at the district office and at the appropriate school site.

(cf. 3580 - District Records)

Physical Inventory

Note: The CPM process for both state and federal categorical programs includes a determination as to whether the district has conducted a physical inventory of equipment within the past two years in accordance with 34 CFR 80.32, as provided below. The <u>California School Accounting Manual</u> recommends that districts conduct a physical inventory at least once a year. The district may revise the following paragraph to specify a timeline shorter than two years.

At least once every two years, a physical inventory of equipment shall be conducted and the results reconciled with the property records. (34 CFR 80.32)

Note: The following two paragraphs are optional. The <u>California School Accounting Manual</u> includes recommended procedures for conducting a physical inventory, including procedures for preparing for the inventory, conducting the inventory count, and recounting. The following paragraph may be revised to reflect any specific district procedures for the physical inventory.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish procedures for conducting the physical inventory which shall include, but not be limited to, designation of person(s) responsible for coordinating and conducting the inventory, preparation and distribution of count sheets, procedures for implementing the inventory, and procedures for conducting a recount to substantiate the validity of the inventory.

The Superintendent or designee shall investigate any differences between the quantities determined by the physical inspection and those in the accounting records.

Business and Noninstructional Operations

In order to provide for the proper control and conservation of district property, the Superintendent or designee shall maintain an inventory of equipment in accordance with law for the following:

- 1. All items currently valued in excess of \$500 (Education Code 35168)
- 2. All items purchased with federal funds that have a useful life of more than one year with an acquisition cost per unit of \$5,000 or more (34 CFR 80.3)

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain an inventory of all property. The following information must be recorded: (Education Code 35168)

- 1. Name and description of the property
- 2. Name of titleholder
- 3. Serial number or other identification number
- 4. Cost of the property (a reasonable estimate may be used if original cost is unknown)
- 5. Acquisition date
- 6. Location of use
- 7. Any ultimate disposition data including the date and method of disposal and sale price

The following information must also be recorded for items acquired with federal funds: (34 CFR 80.32)

- 1. Source of the property (funding source)
- 2. Use and condition of property

3. Percentage of federal participation in the cost of the property

At least once every two years, a physical inventory shall be conducted and the results reconciled with the property records. (34 CFR 80.32)

Each school shall maintain a copy of its inventory and provide a copy of this inventory to the district office. Copies of all district inventories shall be kept at the district office.

RECOVERY FOR PROPERTY LOSS OR DAMAGE

Note: Pursuant to Education Code 48904, parents/guardians are liable for the costs of damages caused by the willful misconduct of their minor children (1) that results in damage to school property, an employee's personal property, or injury or death of a district student, employee, or volunteer, and (2) for any reward paid by the district; see section below entitled "Rewards." The liability of a parent/guardian shall not exceed \$16,650 for damages and \$16,650 for the reward. This amount is adjusted annually for inflation by the Superintendent of Public Instruction. For situations not addressed by the Education Code, Civil Code 1714.1 provides for parent/guardian liability for the willful misconduct of their minor child which results in injury, death, or property damage. The limit under this statute is currently \$37,100 and is adjusted every two years for cost-of-living.

Pursuant to Penal Code 640.5 and 640.6, an individual who has been found to have defaced district property with graffiti may be fined or ordered by a court to perform community service. Depending on the amount of damage, Penal Code 594 also specifies that an individual, or the parent/guardian of a minor, who has been convicted of vandalism may be ordered to clean up and repair the property and to keep the property free from graffiti for one year.

The following optional policy may be modified to reflect district practice.

The Governing Board desires to create a safe and secure learning environment and to minimize acts of vandalism and damage to school property. To discourage such acts, the district shall seek reimbursement of damages, within the limitations specified in law, from any individual, or from the parent/guardian of any minor, who has committed theft or has willfully damaged district or employee property.

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Rewards

Note: Government Code 53069.5 authorizes the Governing Board to offer rewards for information leading to the identification and apprehension of persons who willfully damage or destroy property.

When district or law enforcement officials have not been able to identify the person(s) responsible for the theft or vandalism of district property, the Board may authorize a reward for the identification and apprehension of the responsible person(s).

RECOVERY FOR PROPERTY LOSS OR DAMAGE (continued)

Note: The Board may set any amount for the reward it deems to be appropriate; however, as detailed above, Education Code 48904 specifies a limit on the amount of parent/guardian liability for repayment of the reward.

Option 1 below allows the Superintendent or designee to offer a reward up to \$2,500 without Board approval. Option 2 provides that the Board will determine the amount of any reward offered. Both options may be revised, including the specified reward amount, to reflect district practice.

OPTION 1: The Board authorizes the Superintendent or designee to offer a reward in any amount he/she deems appropriate, not exceeding \$2,500. A reward in excess of \$2,500 shall be authorized in advance by the Board.

OPTION-2: The Board shall determine the appropriate amount for the reward.

Note: The following paragraph applies to all districts.

The Superintendent or designee shall disburse the reward when the guilt of the person responsible for the act has been established by a criminal conviction or other appropriate judicial procedure.

The Governing Board shall seek reimbursement of damages and rewards from any individual or from the custodial parent guardian of any minor who commits any act of theft or vandalism.

Parental liability limits for reimbursement of property loss and/or damages shall be \$27,013 pursuant to SB 1779. In cases of graffiti, a fine of up to \$11,670 is authorized to be collected by the district pursuant to Penal Code 640.5 and 640.6.

Rewards

If law enforcement officials are unable to fix responsibility for the theft or vandalism, the Superintendent or designee is authorized to offer a reward in any amount he/she deems appropriate, not exceeding \$2,500, for information leading to the identification and apprehension of the guilty party. A reward in excess of \$2,500 must be authorized in advance by the Board.

RECOVERY FOR PROPERTY LOSS OR DAMAGE

Note: The following administrative regulation is optional and should be modified to reflect district practice.

Reports by Staff

District employees shall report any damage to or loss of school property to the principal or designee immediately after such damage or loss is discovered. In those instances in which insurance reimbursement may be involved, the principal or designee shall contact the appropriate district official.

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Investigation

Note: Certain acts of graffiti or vandalism may trigger the need for an investigation pursuant to the district's sexual harassment or nondiscrimination grievance procedures (e.g., graffiti that is sexual in nature or disparaging to a class of individuals protected by the district's nondiscrimination policies). See BP 5131.5 - Vandalism and Graffiti.

The Superintendent or designee shall conduct a complete investigation of any instance of damage to or loss of school property and shall consult law enforcement officials when appropriate. If it is determined that the damage has been committed by any district student, the Superintendent or designee shall initiate appropriate disciplinary procedures against the student.

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Recovery of Damages

When the individual causing the damage or loss has been identified and the costs of repair, replacement, or cleanup determined, the Superintendent or designee shall take all practical and reasonable steps to recover the district's costs and shall consult with the district's legal counsel and/or insurance administrator, as appropriate.

RECOVERY FOR PROPERTY LOSS OR DAMAGE (continued)

Such steps may include the filing of a civil complaint in a court of competent jurisdiction to recover damages from the responsible person and, if the responsible person is a minor, from his/her parent/guardian in accordance with law. Damages may include the cost of repair or replacement of the property, the payment of any reward, interest, court costs, and all other damages as provided by law.

Payment of Reward

When authorized according to Board policy, the Superintendent or designee shall pay the reward to the party who provides information sufficient to identify and apprehend the person(s) subsequently determined to be responsible for the damage or loss. If more than one person provides information, the reward shall be divided among them as appropriate.

Reports

District employees shall report all damage or loss of school property to the principal or designee immediately after such damage or loss is discovered. In those instances in which insurance reimbursement may be involved, the principal or designee shall contact the appropriate district official.

Investigation

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that a complete investigation is conducted at the site where the vandalism occurred.

The principal or designee shall conduct a complete investigation of any instance of damage or loss of school property. The investigation shall be carried out in cooperation with law enforcement officials when appropriate.

Recovery of Damages

When the person causing the damage or loss has been identified and the costs of repair, replacement or cleanup determined, the Superintendent or designee shall take all practical and reasonable steps to recover these costs, including consulting district's legal counsel if necessary. Reasonable steps may include the filing of a civil complaint in a court of competent jurisdiction to recover damages from the responsible person.

If the responsible person is a minor, recovery may be sought from the minor's custodial parent/guardian in accordance with Education Code 48904.

Damages may include the cost of repair or replacement of the property, the payment of any reward, interest, court costs, and all other damages as provided by law.

Payment of Reward

When authorized according to Governing Board policy, the reward shall be paid to the

party who provides information sufficient to identify and apprehend the person or persons subsequently found responsible for the damage or loss. If more than one informant provides information, the reward shall be divided among the informants. The Superintendent or designee shall determine who is entitled to what portion of the reward. The identity of the informant shall be considered confidential and shall not be made public by the district.

Inappropriate employee conduct shall include, but not be limited to, engaging in harassing or discriminatory behavior; engaging in inappropriate socialization or fraternization with a student; soliciting, encouraging, or establishing an inappropriate written, verbal, or physical relationship with a student; furnishing tobacco, alcohol, or other illegal or unauthorized substances to a student; or engaging in child abuse.

The Governing Board expects its employees to maintain the highest code of ethics and behave in a professional manner commensurate with their position. An employee's code of ethics should respect the policies and regulations of the district and state and national laws, and should enhance the image of the district and the goals of its educational programs.

Employees are expected to make every effort to maintain a safe, positive school environment that promotes student welfare and academic achievement. Student safety in the areas of physical, emotional, mental and social well-being are of paramount interest and concern to the Board.

Employees shall not fraternize with students outside of bonafide school activities, e.g., taking students to activities that are not sanctioned by the site administrator, interacting with students in ways that would be considered inappropriate, or dating students. Any adult who victimizes a student, regardless of grade level, shall be dealt with to the fullest extent of the law.

HEALTH AND WELFARE BENEFITS 4354

Note: The following optional policy may be revised to reflect district practice.

Districts contracting to participate in the Public Employees' Medical and Hospital Care Act (PEMHCA), Government Code 22750-22944, should revise the following policy and accompanying administrative regulation to reflect the requirements of that program.

The district shall provide health and welfare benefits for certificated and classified employees in bargaining units in accordance with state and federal law and subject to negotiated employee agreements.

Note: Districts should select or revise the appropriate option below to reflect district practice regarding employees who are not in bargaining units. Districts selecting Option 2 should expand this policy or accompanying administrative regulation to specify benefits for unrepresented employees.

OPTION 1: Certificated management, administrative, and supervisory employees who are not in bargaining units shall receive the same health and welfare benefits as those specified in the collective bargaining agreement for certificated employees. Classified management, administrative, and supervisory employees who are not in bargaining units shall receive the same health and welfare benefits as those specified in the collective bargaining agreement for classified employees.

OPTION 2: Employees who are not in bargaining units shall receive health and welfare benefits as specified in Board policy and administrative regulation.

Note: Pursuant to Family Code 297.5, registered domestic partners have the same rights, protections, and benefits as spouses under California law. This law was not affected by the passage of Proposition 8 (2008). Therefore, to the extent that the district provides health benefit coverage to spouses of employees pursuant to state law, the same coverage must be provided to registered domestic partners. Pursuant to Health and Safety Code 1374.58, health care service plans and health insurers are required to provide registered domestic partners coverage that is equal to the coverage provided to spouses.

However, the federal Defense of Marriage Act (1 USC 7) defines marriage for purposes of benefits under federal law as a "union between a man and a woman." Thus, in those cases where federal law grants greater benefits than state law, it is questionable whether those greater benefits also extend to registered domestic partners. Districts with questions about the status of benefits for registered domestic partners or spouses of same-sex marriages should consult legal counsel as appropriate.

For purposes of granting benefits pursuant to state law, a registered domestic partner and his/her child shall have the same rights, protections, and benefits as a spouse and spouse's child. (Family Code 297.5)

Note: The Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) (45 CFR 164.500-164.534) specifies actions that a health plan, health care provider, or health care clearinghouse must take to protect the privacy of an individual's health information. Generally, entities covered by HIPAA may release or receive "protected health information" about an individual only if that individual gives permission or the Act expressly permits its release.

Civil Code 56.20-56.245 address an employer's responsibility to maintain the confidentiality of medical information it receives.

The Superintendent or designee shall not use or disclose any medical information the district possesses pertaining to an employee without the employee's authorization obtained in accordance with Civil Code 56.21, except for the purpose of administering and maintaining employee benefit plans and for other purposes specified in law. (Civil Code 56.20)

Continuation of Coverage

Note: Education Code 7000-7005 provide for continued health and dental care benefits for retired certificated employees and their spouses/domestic partners. In addition, for districts with 20 or more employees, continued health and disability benefits for former classified and certificated employees and their qualified beneficiaries are addressed in the federal Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1985 (COBRA) (26 USC 4980B; 29 USC 1161-1168; 26 CFR 54.4980B-1-54.4980B-10). For districts with 2-19 employees, continued health and disability benefits for former employees and their qualified beneficiaries are addressed in the California Continuation Benefits Replacement Act (Cal-COBRA) (Health and Safety Code 1366.20-1366.29; Insurance Code 10128.50-10128.59). These programs provide continuation coverage for limited time periods and under limited conditions. The following section reflects the general purposes of these programs, while major program requirements are summarized in the accompanying administrative regulation.

Retired certificated employees, other employees who would otherwise lose coverage due to a qualifying event specified in law and administrative regulation, and their qualified beneficiaries may continue to participate in the district's group health and welfare benefits in accordance with state and federal law.

Note: Covered employees and their qualified beneficiaries who elect continuation coverage may be required to pay all costs of the insurance plan as provided in Option 1 below (Education Code 7000; Health and Safety Code 1366.26; Insurance Code 10128.56; 26 USC 4980B). Either Option 1 or Option 2 may be revised to reflect district practice. The district contribution to retired employee health costs is a negotiable item.

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (26 USC 6432, as amended by P.L. 111-5) establishes a subsidy to cover 65 percent of the premium for health care continuation coverage for "assistance eligible individuals" who were involuntarily terminated between September 1, 2008 and December 31, 2009; see the section "Temporary Subsidized Premium for COBRA/Cal-COBRA" in the accompanying administrative regulation.

OPTION 1: To receive continuation coverage, covered employees and their qualified beneficiaries shall pay the premiums, dues, and other charges, including any increases in premiums, dues, and costs incurred by the district in administering this program.

OPTION 2: The district contribution toward continuation health coverage for covered employees and their qualified beneficiaries shall be the same as for current employees participating in the group health plan.

Note: Pursuant to Governmental Accounting and Standards Board Statement 45, "other postemployment benefits" (OPEBs) (i.e., medical, dental, vision, hearing, life insurance, long-term care, long-term disability, and other nonpension benefits for retired employees) must be reported by the district as a current expense over the working years of an employee. To the extent that OPEBs are not prefunded in a designated fund or irrevocable trust, they must be reported as a liability on the district's financial statements. See BP 3100 - Budget and AR 3460 - Financial Reports and Accountability.

Board Policy

Health And Welfare Benefits

BP 4154 4254,4354 Personnel

The district shall provide health and welfare benefits for certificated and classified employees in bargaining units in accordance with state and federal law and subject to negotiated employee agreements.

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Employees who are not in bargaining units shall receive health and welfare benefits as specified in Board policy and administrative regulation.

To the extent that benefits are granted to spouses of employees, domestic partners registered in accordance with Family Code 297 shall have the same benefits. (Family Code 297.5)

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain the confidentiality of employee health records in accordance with law.

Retired Employees

Retired employees and other qualified persons may continue to participate in the district's group health and welfare benefit plan and dental care benefit plan in accordance with state and federal law.

To receive continuation coverage under this program, covered employees and qualified beneficiaries shall pay the premiums, dues and other charges, including any increases in premiums or dues, and costs incurred by the district in administering this program.

HEALTH AND WELFARE BENEFITS 4354

Note: The following administrative regulation is **optional** and may be deleted if addressed in the district's collective bargaining agreements.

Pursuant to Family Code 297.5, registered domestic partners have the same rights, protections, and benefits as spouses under California law. Therefore, to the extent that the district provides health benefit coverage under state law to spouses of employees, the same coverage must be provided to registered domestic partners. However, the federal Defense of Marriage Act (1 USC 7) defines marriage for purposes of benefits under federal law as a "union between a man and a woman." Thus, in those cases where federal law grants greater benefits than state law, it is questionable whether those greater benefits also extend to registered domestic partners. Districts with questions about the status of benefits for registered domestic partners or spouses of same-sex marriages should consult legal counsel as appropriate. Also see the accompanying Board policy.

Retired Certificated Employees

Note: Education Code 7000 requires that any district which provides health and welfare benefits or dental care benefits for its certificated employees must make those benefits available to retired certificated employees and their spouses or eligible surviving spouses as provided in the following section.

The following section does not apply to employees who receive health care coverage under the Public Employees' Medical and Hospital Care Act (PEMHCA), Government Code 22750-22944.

Any former certificated employee who retired from the district under any public retirement system and his/her spouse/domestic partner shall be permitted to enroll in the health and welfare and/or dental care benefit plan currently provided for certificated employees. The plan also shall be available to any surviving spouse/domestic partner of a former certificated employee who either retired from the district or was, at the time of death, employed by the district and a member of the State Teachers' Retirement System. (Education Code 7000)

A retired certificated employee or surviving spouse/domestic partner shall be allowed to enroll in the coverage within 30 days of losing active employee coverage. (Education Code 7000)

Note: The following paragraph is optional. Education Code 7000 authorizes, but does not require, districts to deny coverage to persons who fail to enroll during the initial enrollment period or who voluntarily terminate coverage.

If a retired certificated employee or surviving spouse/domestic partner fails to enroll during the initial enrollment period, further opportunity to do so shall be denied. A person who has previously received but then voluntarily terminated coverage also shall be excluded from obtaining further coverage.

COBRA/Cal-COBRA Continuation Coverage

Note: The following section reflects requirements for both the federal Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1985 (COBRA) program (26 USC 4980B; 29 USC 1161-1168; 26 CFR 54.4980B-1-54.4980B-10) and the California Continuation Benefits Replacement Act (Cal-COBRA) program (Health and Safety Code 1366.20-1366.29; Insurance Code 10128.50-10128.59). These programs contain certain group health coverage requirements designed to alleviate lapses in coverage due to employee termination, death, separation or divorce, reduction in hours, eligibility for Medicare, or a dependent child of the covered employee ceasing to be a dependent child. COBRA applies to districts with at least 20 employees. Cal-COBRA applies to districts with 2-19 employees which have contracted for health care and/or disability coverage through a group benefit plan. If the district has contracted to provide administrative services for the health care service plan as authorized by Health and Safety Code 1366.25, it may expand the following section to reflect additional requirements of plan administrators.

The following section should be revised by districts that offer a group health insurance plan but not a group disability benefits plan. This section also should be revised by districts with employees who receive health care coverage under PEMHCA, Government Code 22750-22944.

Covered district employees and their qualified beneficiaries shall be offered the opportunity to continue health and disability insurance coverage when they otherwise would lose coverage due to one of the following qualifying events: (Health and Safety Code 1366.21, 1366.23, 1373; Insurance Code 10128.51, 10128.53, 10277; 26 USC 4980B; 26 CFR 54.4980B-4)

- 1. Death of the covered employee
- 2. Termination or reduction in hours of the covered employee's employment, other than termination by reason of the employee's gross misconduct

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(cf. 4117.4 - Dismissal)
(cf. 4218 - Dismissal/Suspension/Disciplinary Action)
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- 3. Divorce or legal separation of the covered employee
- 4. Covered employee's becoming entitled to Medicare benefits

Note: COBRA and Cal-COBRA extend the opportunity to continue coverage to a person who would otherwise lose coverage when he/she ceases to be a dependent child of a covered employee, as provided in item #5 below. In addition, Health and Safety Code 1373 requires a health services plan or insurer to continue coverage for a dependent child who attains the limiting age specified in the plan if the child is incapable of self-sustaining employment by reason of a physically or mentally disabling injury, illness, or condition and the child is chiefly dependent on the subscriber or insured for support and maintenance. As amended by SB 1168 (Ch. 390, Statutes of 2008), Health and Safety Code 1373 also requires continued coverage for a dependent child over age 18 if the child is enrolled at a secondary or postsecondary educational institution and takes a medical leave of absence as specified.

5. A dependent child ceasing to be a dependent child of the covered employee

Continuation health coverage shall be the same as provided to similarly situated individuals under the group benefit plan. (Health and Safety Code 1366.23; Insurance Code 10128.53; 26 USC 4980B)

Note: Option 1 below reflects federal COBRA requirements for districts with 20 or more employees. Option 2 reflects Cal-COBRA requirements for districts with 2-19 employees. Districts should select the appropriate option.

OPTION 1: (Districts with 20 or more employees)

Note: Pursuant to 26 USC 4980B and 29 USC 1163, the 30-day notification period specified below may be revised if a longer time period is specified in the health plan.

The Superintendent or designee shall notify the health care service plan administrator of a qualifying event listed in item #1, 2, or 4 above, within 30 days of the event. A covered employee or qualified beneficiary shall notify the service plan administrator of a qualifying event listed in item #3 or 5 above within 60 days of the event or of the date that the beneficiary would lose coverage, whichever is later. (26 USC 4980B; 29 USC 1163, 1166)

Continuation coverage shall be terminated in accordance with the district's insurance plan and in accordance with 26 USC 4980B and 26 CFR 54.4980B-6.

OPTION 2: (Districts with 2-19 employees)

Note: If the district contracts to perform the administrative services of a health care service plan as authorized by Health and Safety Code 1366.25, the following two paragraphs should be revised to reflect the plan administrator to whom the notifications should be directed.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide written notification to the health care service plan administrator of a qualifying event listed in item #2 above, within 30 days of the event. A covered employee or qualified beneficiary shall provide written notification to the health care service plan administrator regarding any other qualifying event listed above within 60 days of the event or of the date that the covered employee or qualified beneficiary was notified of the ability to continue coverage, whichever is later. (Health and Safety Code 1366.24, 1366.25; Insurance Code 10128.54, 10128.55)

Continuation coverage shall be terminated in accordance with the district's insurance plan and in accordance with Health and Safety Code 1366.22 and 1366.27 and Insurance Code 10128.52 and 10128.57.

Note: The remainder of this section applies to all districts.

Health and Safety Code 1373.621 allows former employees who meet certain eligibility criteria to continue benefits beyond the date that coverage under COBRA or Cal-COBRA would end for themselves and their spouse/registered domestic partner, as provided below.

However, a former employee who, prior to January 1, 2005, worked for the district for at least five years and who was age 60 or older on the date employment ended, or his/her qualified beneficiaries which includes dependent children or spouse/former spouse/domestic partner, may continue benefits until the earlier of any of the following events: (Health and Safety Code 1373.621; Insurance Code 10116.5)

- 1. The date the individual reaches age 65
- 2. The date the individual is covered under any other group health plan not maintained by the district, regardless of whether that coverage is less valuable
- 3. The date the individual becomes entitled to Medicare benefits
- 4. For a qualified beneficiary, five years from the date on which continuation coverage was scheduled to end for the qualified beneficiary
- 5. The date on which the district terminates its agreement with the health service plan and ceases to provide coverage for any active employees through that plan, in which case the former employee and/or his/her qualified beneficiary shall have a right to a conversion plan

The Superintendent or designee shall notify covered employees and qualified beneficiaries of the availability of conversion and continuation coverage. This notification shall include the statement in Labor Code 2800.2 encouraging individuals to examine their options carefully before declining such coverage. (Labor Code 2800.2)

(cf. 4112.9/4212.9/4312.9 - Employee Notifications)

Temporary Subsidized Premium for COBRA/Cal-COBRA

Note: The following optional section applies to districts that participate in either COBRA or Cal-COBRA for health care continuation coverage. The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (26 USC 6432, as amended by P.L. 111-5) provides for a temporary reduction in the premium otherwise payable by involuntarily terminated individuals who elect continuation coverage and their qualified beneficiaries.

"Assistance eligible individuals" are those who are involuntarily terminated (other than by reason of gross

misconduct) between September 1, 2008 and December 31, 2009. In addition, the law provided a "second chance" to individuals who were terminated between September 1, 2008 and February 17, 2009 (the date that the law was enacted), who either failed to elect COBRA at that time or elected COBRA but were no longer covered as of February 17, 2009. For further information about the circumstances that constitute "involuntary termination" for purposes of the premium subsidy, see Internal Revenue Service guidance Premium Assistance for COBRA Benefits.

Assistance eligible individuals pay 35 percent of the premium amount they would be required to pay for continuation coverage if they were not eligible for the subsidy, and the remaining balance of the premium is reimbursable to the employer, insurer, or health plan as a credit against payroll taxes as provided below. Thus, if employees normally pay the full premium for continuation coverage, an assistance eligible individual would be required to pay 35 percent of the full premium. However, if the district normally contributes a portion of the premium, then the assistance eligible individual would pay 35 percent of the normal employee share and the district would be reimbursed for 65 percent of the employee share.

If subsidized coverage is denied by the health plan, an individual may appeal to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and shall receive a decision regarding his/her eligibility within 15 business days after receipt of the individual's application for review.

AB 23 (Ch. 3, Statutes of 2009) amended various sections of the Health and Safety Code and Insurance Code to make the subsidy applicable to eligible individuals through the Cal-COBRA program.

Employees whose employment is involuntarily terminated, other than by reason of gross misconduct, between September 1, 2008 and December 31, 2009, and their qualified beneficiaries shall pay 35 percent of the premium amount they would otherwise be required to pay for health care continuation coverage, with the remainder to be subsidized through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act. (26 USC 6432; Health and Safety Code 1366.25; Insurance Code 10128.55)

Note: Pursuant to 26 USC 6432 Note, assistance eligible individuals are eligible for up to nine months of subsidy. However, coverage can end earlier under the circumstances specified below, including new coverage that is available because of new employment or through a spouse's employer. For further information about continued eligibility for premium reduction, see Internal Revenue Service guidance Premium Assistance for COBRA Benefits.

The premium reduction shall apply until one of the following dates, whichever comes first: (26 USC 6432 Note)

- 1. Nine months after the first day of the first month for which the premium reduction applies to the assistance eligible individual
- 2. The first date that the assistance eligible individual becomes eligible for Medicare coverage or other group health plan coverage, with certain exceptions specified in law

3. The date the assistance eligible individual ceases to be eligible for continuation coverage for other reasons as noted in the section "Continuation of Coverage" above

Because the premium reduction will be offset by an increase in income tax liability for individuals who earn more than \$125,000 for the tax year (or \$250,000 for married couples filing a joint federal income tax return), such individuals may choose to permanently waive their right to the subsidy. (26 USC 139C)

Note: In addition to the general notice to qualified beneficiaries described above in the section "COBRA/Cal-COBRA Continuation Coverage," 20 USC 6432 Note contains specific requirements for notifications to eligible individuals regarding the premium subsidy. Model notices have been prepared by the U.S. Department of Labor and are available on its web site. Health and Safety Code 1366.25 and Insurance Code 10128.55 contain similar notice requirements for participants in the Cal-COBRA program.

The Superintendent or designee shall, within 14 days of receiving notice of the qualifying event, notify assistance eligible individuals of the availability of the subsidy and the option to enroll in different coverage if the district permits assistance eligible individuals to elect enrollment in different coverage. Assistance eligible individuals shall have 60 days from the date the notice is provided to elect coverage. (26 USC 6432 Note; Health and Safety Code 1366.24, 1366.25; Insurance Code 10128.55)

Note: Pursuant to 26 USC 6432, the district's payment of 65 percent of the normal employee share of the premium will be recovered from the federal government through a credit on its payroll tax return or, if the district participates in Cal-COBRA, through the district's insurance carrier. If the district participates in a multiemployer group health plan, the insurer will instead pay the subsidy and receive the reimbursement.

In order to receive reimbursement of district payments toward the normal employee share of the premium as allowed by law, the Superintendent or designee shall maintain records regarding assistance eligible individuals and the amounts paid by the district in accordance with 26 USC 6432.

Disability Insurance

Note: The following notice is provided by the California Employment Development Department pursuant to Unemployment Insurance Code 2613.

The Superintendent or designee shall give notice of disability insurance rights and benefits to each new employee and each employee leaving work due to pregnancy, nonoccupational illness or injury, or the need to provide care for any sick or injured family member, or the need to bond with a minor child within the first year of the child's birth or placement in connection with foster care or adoption. (Unemployment Insurance Code 2613)

- 3. The divorce or legal separation of the covered employee
- 4. The covered employee's becoming entitled to Medicare benefits

5. A dependent child ceasing to be a dependent child of the covered employee

Continuation health coverage shall be the same as provided to similarly situated individuals under the group benefit plan. (Health and Safety Code 1366.23; Insurance Code 10128.53; 26 USC 4980B)

The Superintendent or designee shall notify the health care service plan administrator of a qualifying event listed in item #1, 2 or 4 above, within 30 days of the event. A qualified beneficiary shall notify the service plan administrator of a qualifying event listed in item #3 or 5 above within 60 days of the event or of the date that the beneficiary would lose coverage, whichever is later. (26 USC 4980B; 29 USC 1163)

Continuation coverage shall be terminated in accordance with the district's insurance plan and in accordance with 26 USC 4980B and 26 CFR 54.4980B-6.

However, a former employee who, prior to January 1, 2005, worked for the district for at least five years and who was age 60 or older on the date employment ended, or his/her spouse/domestic partner or former spouse/domestic partner, may continue benefits until the earlier of any of the following events: (Health and Safety Code 1373.621; Insurance Code 10116.5)

- 1. The date the individual reaches age 65
- 2. The date the individual is covered under any other group health plan, regardless of whether that coverage is less valuable
- 3. The date the individual becomes entitled to Medicare benefits
- 4. For a spouse/domestic partner, five years from the date on which continuation coverage was scheduled to end for the spouse/domestic partner
- 5. The date on which the district terminates its agreement with the health service plan and ceases to provide coverage for any active employees through that plan, in which case the former employee and/or his/her spouse/domestic partner shall have a right to a conversion plan

The Superintendent or designee shall notify qualified beneficiaries of the availability of conversion and continuation coverage. This notification shall include the statement in Labor Code 2800.2 encouraging individuals to examine their options carefully before declining such coverage. (Labor Code 2800.2)

CSBA Sample Board Policy

Students

GRADES/EVALUATION OF STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

Note: The following optional policy may be revised to reflect district practice.

The Governing Board believes that grades serve a valuable instructional purpose by helping students and parents/guardians understand performance expectations and identifying the student's areas of strength and those areas needing improvement. Parents/guardians and students have the right to receive course grades that represent an accurate evaluation of the student's achievement.

BP 5121(a)

(cf. 5020 - Parent Rights and Responsibilities) (cf. 5125.2 - Withholding Grades, Diploma or Transcripts)

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a uniform grading system based on standards that apply to all students in that course and grade level. Principals and teachers shall ensure that student grades conform to this system. Teachers shall inform students and parents/guardians how student achievement will be evaluated in the classroom.

A teacher shall base a student's grades on impartial, consistent observation of the quality of the student's work and his/her mastery of course content and district standards. Students shall have the opportunity to demonstrate this mastery through a variety of methods such as classroom participation, homework, tests, and portfolios.

(cf. 6011 - Academic Standards) (cf. 6162.5 - Student Assessment)

Note: Education Code 49066 provides that the grade assigned by a teacher is final, absent any clerical or mechanical mistake, fraud, bad faith, or incompetency. Pursuant to Education Code 49066, the Governing Board and Superintendent cannot order a student's grade changed unless the teacher, to the extent practicable, is given an opportunity to state the reasons why the grade was given and to be included in all discussions regarding the changing of the grade; see AR 5125.3 - Challenging Student Records. In Las Virgenes Educators Association v. Las Virgenes Unified School District, the court determined that a citizenship mark is a "grade" within the meaning of Education Code 49066 and upheld a teacher's right to make the final decision regarding a citizenship mark.

The teacher of each course shall determine the student's grade. The grade assigned by the teacher shall not be changed by the Board or the Superintendent except as provided by law, Board policy, or administrative regulation. (Education Code 49066)

Note: The following optional paragraph is for use by districts that maintain elementary schools and should be revised to reflect district practice.

Students in grades K-3 shall receive progress reports rather than letter grades.

When reporting student performance to parents/guardians, teachers may add narrative descriptions, observational notes, and/or samples of classroom work in order to better describe student progress in specific skills and subcategories of achievement.

Note: The following optional paragraph reflects correspondence issued by the U.S. Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights, Report Cards and Transcripts for Students with Disabilities, which clarifies that, because report cards are intended for parents/guardians and not for persons outside the district, they may contain information about a student's disability without violating the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (20 USC 1232g; 34 CFR 99.1-99.67). However, transcripts may not provide information about a student's disability because there is an expectation that these documents could be shared with persons other than the student and his/her parents/guardians. See BP/AR 5125 - Student Records for further information regarding the confidentiality of student records.

A report card for a student with a disability may contain information about his/her disability, including whether that student received special education or related services, provided that the report card informs parents/guardians about their child's progress or level of achievement in specific classes, course content, or curriculum. However, transcripts that may be used to inform postsecondary institutions or prospective employers of the student's academic achievements shall not contain information disclosing the student's disability.

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Effect of Absences on Grades

If a student misses class without an excuse and does not subsequently turn in homework, take a test, or fulfill another class requirement which he/she missed, the teacher may lower the student's grade for nonperformance.

Note: Pursuant to Education Code 49067, the Board may authorize teachers to assign failing grades to students with excessive unexcused absences, the number to be set by the Board.

Districts using the following optional paragraph should fill in the blank to specify the number of unexcused absences for which students may receive a failing grade.

The Board believes that 10 unexcused absences per grading period constitute excessive unexcused absences. Students with excessive unexcused absences may receive a failing grade and not receive credit for the class(es).

Grade Point Average

Note: The following optional section is for use by districts that maintain secondary schools and may be revised to reflect district practice. Also see the accompanying administrative regulation.

The Superintendent or designee shall determine the methodology to be used in calculating students' grade point averages (GPA), including the courses to be included within the GPA and whether extra grade weighting shall be applied to Advanced Placement, honors, and/or concurrent postsecondary courses.

Board Policy

Grades/Evaluation Of Student Achievement

BP 5121 **Students**

The Governing Board believes that grades serve a valuable instructional purpose by helping students and parents/guardians identify the student's areas of strength and those areas needing improvement. Parents/guardians and students have the right to receive course grades that represent an accurate evaluation of the student's achievement.

(cf. 5020 - Parent Rights and Responsibilities)

The teacher of each course shall determine the student's grade. The grade assigned by the teacher shall not be changed by the Board or the Superintendent except as provided by law, Board policy and administrative regulation. (Education Code 49066)

(cf. 5125.3 - Challenging Student Records)

Teachers shall evaluate a student's work in relation to standards which apply to all students at his/her grade level. The Superintendent or designee shall establish and regularly evaluate a uniform grading system, and principals shall ensure that student grades conform to this system. Teachers shall inform students and parents/guardians how student achievement will be evaluated in the classroom.

(cf. 5124 - Communication with Parents/Guardians) (cf. 6011 - Academic Standards)

Grades should be based on impartial, consistent observation of the quality of the student's work and his/her mastery of course content and objectives. Students shall have the opportunity to demonstrate this mastery through a variety of methods such as classroom participation, homework, tests and portfolios.

When reporting student grades to parents/guardians, teachers may add narrative descriptions, observational notes and/or samples of classroom work in order to better describe student progress in specific skills and subcategories of achievement.

Unexcused Absences

Students with excessive absences may be given a failing grade and not receive credit for the class(es). Fifteen percent absences per grading period shall constitute excessive absences for this purpose in grades K-8. At the comprehensive high school level, after 10 absences in any class, a student may lose credit for that class. At the continuation high school, the student is expected to make up all "unexcused" absences and all "excused"

absences after the fourth absence each trimester.

Grade Point Average (GPA)

The Superintendent or designee shall recommend to the Board whether extra grade weighting will be assigned for honors courses that are substantially similar in depth, breadth and rigor to an Advanced Placement course, an entry-level college course or a community college level course.

GRADES/EVALUATION OF STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

Note: Education Code 49067 mandates the Governing Board to prescribe regulations requiring the evaluation of each student's achievement for each grading period. The following administrative regulation should be revised to reflect district practice and the grade levels offered by the district.

Written report cards displaying students' grades in each subject or course shall be distributed to parents/guardians at the end of each grading period. Parents/guardians shall be offered an opportunity to meet with their child's teacher(s) to discuss the grades and strategies to improve their child's performance.

(cf. 6020 - Parent Involvement)

Note: Education Code 49067 mandates that the Board prescribe regulations requiring either a conference with the parent/guardian or a written report sent to the parent/guardian whenever a student is in danger of failing a course. Pursuant to Education Code 49067, the refusal of a parent/guardian to attend the conference or to respond to the written report shall not preclude failing the student at the end of the grading period.

Whenever it becomes evident to a teacher that a student is in danger of failing a course, the teacher shall arrange a conference with the student's parent/guardian or send the parent/guardian a written report. (Education Code 49067)

Note: The following optional paragraph is for use by districts that maintain high schools.

For each student in grades 9-12, the Superintendent or designee shall maintain a transcript recording the courses taken, the term that each course was taken, credits earned, final grades, and date of graduation.

Note: The following optional section may be revised to reflect district practice, including plus/minus signs if appropriate.

For grades 4 6-12, grades for achievement shall be reported for each grading period as follows:

An Incomplete shall be given only when a student's work is not finished because of illness or other excused absence. If not made up within six weeks, the Incomplete shall become an F.

Note: The following optional paragraph is for use by districts that maintain high schools and choose to assign extra grade weighting to Advanced Placement, honors, or concurrent postsecondary courses.

Districts should be aware that, in determining college admissions eligibility, the extra grade weighting will be factored into university admissions only if the courses have been certified as honors courses by the University of California and are in the following "a-g" subjects: history-social science, English, advanced mathematics, laboratory science, language other than English, and visual and performing arts.

Because of the more rigorous nature of Advanced Placement, honors, and concurrent postsecondary courses, students receiving a grade of A, B, or C in those courses shall receive extra grade weighting as follows:

Grades for Physical Education

No grade of a student participating in a physical education class may be adversely affected due to the fact that the student, because of circumstances beyond his/her control, does not wear standardized physical education apparel. (Education Code 49066)

Note: The following paragraph is for use by districts that maintain high schools and may be revised to reflect additional grade levels at the district's discretion. 5 CCR 10060 lists criteria by which districts must appraise the quality of high school physical education programs, including criteria for reporting student achievement in physical education.

Student performance in high school physical education courses shall be based upon evaluation of the student's individual progress, attainment of goals in each instructional area, tests designed to determine skill and knowledge, and physical performance tests. (5 CCR 10060)

Note: The following optional paragraph may be used by districts that allow high school students to fulfill physical education credits through interscholastic athletics carried on wholly or partially after regular school hours pursuant to Education Code 51242; see BP 6142.7 - Physical Education.

High school students using interscholastic athletic participation to fulfill physical education requirements, as authorized by Education Code 51242, may be graded on this participation provided that a teacher credentialed to teach physical education supervises this participation and assigns the grade.

Grades for College Courses

Note: The following optional section is for use by districts maintaining grades 9-12 that choose to grant district credit for completion of postsecondary courses pursuant to Education Code 48800-48802 and 76000-76002; see BP/AR 6172.1 - Concurrent Enrollment in College Classes.

When the district has approved a student to receive district credit for coursework completed at a community college or four-year college, he/she shall receive the same letter grade as is granted by the college.

Grades for Citizenship, Study Skills, and Effort

Grades for citizenship, study skills, and effort shall be reported as follows:

- O Outstanding
- S Satisfactory
- N Needs Improvement

U Unsatisfactory

Pass/Fail Grading

Note: The district may choose to expand the following **optional** section to identify specific courses or programs for which students may elect a pass/fail grade rather than an A-F grade (e.g., alternative education program, non-college-preparatory summer school courses, etc.).

The Superintendent or designee may identify courses or programs for which students may, with parent/guardian permission, elect to earn a Pass or Fail grade instead of a letter grade.

Students who receive a Pass grade shall acquire the appropriate semester units of credit for the course. The grade shall not be counted in determining class rank, honors list, or membership in the California Scholarship Federation. Students who receive a Fail grade shall not receive credit for taking the course.

Peer Grading

Note: In Owasso Independent School District v. Falvo, the U.S. Supreme Court held that students' grades on assignments and tests are not "education records" until the teacher records them, and therefore the practice of peer grading does not violate the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA) (20 USC 1232g); see BP/AR 5125 - Student Records. Furthermore, for the same reason, the Supreme Court did not prohibit the practice of having students report the grades aloud so that the teacher may record them. The following section is optional.

At their discretion, teachers may use peer grading of student tests, papers, and assignments as appropriate to reinforce lessons.

Repeating Classes

Note: The following optional section is for use by districts that maintain high schools.

With the approval of the principal or designee, a student may repeat a course in order to raise his/her grade. Both grades received shall be entered on the student's transcript, but the student shall receive credit only once for taking the course.

Note: Options 1 and 2 below provide two methods for recording the grade of a student who has repeated a class. Districts selecting Option 2 must be cautious to report both grades on the transcript rather than reporting an "averaged" grade on the transcript since reporting an averaged grade might be construed as a change of grade, which is prohibited pursuant to Education Code 49066. However, an averaged grade may be used in determining the student's overall grade point average (GPA).

OPTION 1: The highest grade received shall be used in determining the student's overall grade point average (GPA).

OPTION 2: The two grades shall be averaged in determining the student's overall grade point average (GPA).

Withdrawal from Classes

Note: The following optional section is for use by districts maintaining secondary grades and should be revised to reflect district practice.

A student who drops a course during the first six weeks of the grading period may do so without any entry on his/her permanent record card. A student who drops a course after the first six weeks of the grading period shall receive an F grade on his/her permanent record, unless otherwise decided by the principal or designee because of extenuating circumstances.

Effect of Absences on Grades

Note: Education Code 49067 mandates districts that authorize teachers to assign failing grades to students who have excessive unexcused absences (see the accompanying Board policy) to establish regulations which include, but are not limited to, providing (1) a reasonable opportunity for the student or parent/guardian to explain the absences and (2) a method for identifying in the student's record the failing grades assigned on the basis of unexcused absences.

Teachers who withhold class credit because of excessive unexcused absences shall so inform students and parents/guardians at the beginning of the school year or semester. When a student reaches the number of unexcused absences defined as excessive in Board policy, the student and parent/guardian shall again be notified of the district's policy regarding excessive unexcused absences.

(cf. 5113 - Absences and Excuses)

The student and parent/guardian shall have a reasonable opportunity to explain the absences. (Education Code 49067)

If a student receives a failing grade because of excessive unexcused absences, the student's record shall specify that the grade was assigned because of excessive unexcused absences. (Education Code 49067)

Grades for a student in foster care shall not be lowered if the student is absent from school due to either of the following circumstances: (Education Code 49069.5)

- 1. A decision by a court or placement agency to change the student's placement, in which case the student's grades and credits shall be calculated as of the date the student left school
- 2. A verified court appearance or related court-ordered activity

(cf. 6173.1 - Education for Foster Youth)

Grade Point Average

Note: The following optional section should be revised to reflect the district's methodology for calculating GPA. Districts may calculate multiple GPAs for a single student (e.g., academic GPA, total GPA) for different purposes (e.g., eligibility for extracurricular activities, athletic programs, honors at graduation, or other district programs that use GPA as a criterion). Districts should be aware that, in determining college admissions eligibility, the California State University and the University of California consider students' GPA in the "a-g" subjects required for college entry based on grades recorded in their high school transcripts.

The Superintendent or designee shall calculate each student's GPA using the grade points assigned to each letter grade in accordance with the scale described in the section "Grades for Achievement" above. The grade points for all applicable coursework shall be totaled and divided by the number of courses completed.

(cf. 6145 - Extracurricular and Cocurricular Activities)

OPTION 1: When plus and minus designations are added to letter grades, they shall not be considered in determining GPA.

OPTION 2: When plus and minus designations are added to letter grades, a plus shall be computed by adding 0.3 to the value assigned the letter grade and a minus shall be computed by subtracting 0.3 from the value assigned to the letter grade.

The grade shall not be counted in determining class rank, honors list, or membership in the California Scholarship Federation. Students who receive an F grade shall not receive credit for taking the course.

Peer Grading

At their discretion, teachers may use peer grading of student tests, papers and assignments as appropriate to reinforce lessons.

(cf. 5125 - Student Records)

Repeating Classes

With the approval of the principal or designee, a student may repeat a course in order to raise his/her grade. Both grades received shall be entered on the student's transcript, but the student shall receive credit only once for taking the course.

The highest grade received shall be used in determining the student's overall grade point average. Failing grades, however, are always a part of a student's GPA.

Withdrawal from Classes

After the 10th class period, withdrawals must be staff initiated and approved by an administrator. After the 10th class period, but before the end of the first or third quarter report period, students will be subject to a "WP" (Withdraw-Pass) or "WF" (Withdraw-Fail) grade. A "WF" will affect the GPA. No credit is awarded and the WP/WF will appear on the semester transcript. There will be no class withdrawals during the final quarter in either semester.

Absences from School

If a student receives a failing grade because of unexcused absences, the student's record shall specify that the grade was assigned because of excessive unexcused absences. (Education Code 49067)

VANDALISM AND GRAFFITI

Note: The following **optional** policy may be modified to reflect district practice. Strategies regarding graffiti prevention and removal may be included as part of a school's comprehensive safety plan (see BP/AR 0450 - Comprehensive Safety Plan), campus security procedures (see BP/AR 3515 - Campus Security), or gang prevention techniques (see BP/AR 5136 - Gangs). Government Code 53069.5 authorizes districts to create a reward program to encourage the identification of individuals who have committed vandalism (see BP/AR 3515.4 - Recovery for Property Loss or Damage).

The Governing Board desires to enhance student learning by striving to provide an environment where students and staff can feel safe and secure and can take pride in their school. To that end, the Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies for preventing graffiti and vandalism on school grounds, including collaborating with local law enforcement and city and county officials, as appropriate, to help develop a coordinated response to graffiti and vandalism in the community.

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(cf. 0450 - Comprehensive Safety Plan)
(cf. 1400 - Relations Between Other Governmental Agencies and the Schools)
(cf. 3515 - Campus Security)
(cf. 3515.3 - District Police/Security Department)
(cf. 5131.7 - Positive School Climate)

(cf. 5138 - Conflict Resolution/Peer Mediation)
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Note: Certain acts of graffiti or vandalism may trigger the need for an investigation pursuant to the district's sexual harassment or nondiscrimination grievance procedures (e.g., graffiti that is sexual in nature or disparaging to a class of individuals protected by the district's nondiscrimination policies).

Students and staff are encouraged to report any graffiti or vandalism to the principal or designee for investigation. The principal or designee shall determine whether the incident necessitates an investigation pursuant to the district's sexual harassment, hate-motivated behavior, or nondiscrimination grievance procedure.

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(cf. 5145.3 - Nondiscrimination/Harassment)
(cf. 5145.7 - Sexual Harassment)
(cf. 5145.9 - Hate-Motivated Behavior)
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Note: Pursuant to Penal Code 594 and 594.1, any person who commits vandalism, defaces property with graffiti, or possesses certain tools or objects (e.g., spray paint cans, markers) with the intent to commit vandalism or deface property with graffiti may be guilty of a misdemeanor and punished by a fine and/or community service. Other local laws may apply since many cities and counties have adopted ordinances prohibiting vandalism and graffiti within their boundaries. In addition, some types of graffiti or vandalism may be evidence of a hate crime.

VANDALISM AND GRAFFITI (continued)

As appropriate, the principal or designee may contact local law enforcement in instances when the graffiti is repetitive, identifies particular targets or groups, identifies the perpetrator, and/or contains incitements to violence, threats, or intimidation. Photographs or other evidence of the vandalism or graffiti shall be preserved as necessary for investigation by the district or law enforcement and as evidence in any district disciplinary proceedings.

The principal or designee shall ensure that graffiti on school grounds is removed and covered as soon as possible, and if practicable before the beginning of the school day.

Note: Education Code 48904 and Civil Code 1714.1 specify that a parent/guardian may be liable for damages to school property resulting from the willful misconduct of his/her minor child; see BP/AR 3515.4 - Recovery for Property Loss or Damage.

A student who commits an act of vandalism or graffiti on school grounds shall be subject to disciplinary action, including, but not limited to, suspension or expulsion in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation. If reparation for damages is not made, the district also may withhold the student's grades, diploma, and/or transcripts in accordance with law.

TOBACCO

Note: The following optional policy may be revised to reflect district practice. Education Code 48901 requires any district maintaining a high school to take all steps deemed practical to discourage high school students from smoking. Tobacco-use prevention resources generally encourage prevention efforts to begin as early as possible, including in the middle or elementary grades.

The state's Tobacco-Use Prevention Education (TUPE) grant program (Health and Safety Code 104350-104495) provides support for local tobacco-use prevention and intervention programs. Effective July 1, 2009, the portion of the TUPE program that provided an annual entitlement for grades 4-8 was eliminated, but districts may still apply for competitive grants for programs for grades 6-12. In addition, the federal Safe and Drug-Free Schools and Communities (SDFSC) program (20 USC 7111-7117) provides funding for tobacco-use prevention (together with alcohol and other drug and violence prevention) for grades K-12; see BP/AR 5131.6 - Alcohol and Other Drugs.

During the Categorical Program Monitoring process, the California Department of Education (CDE) will review whether the district has met the major requirements of the program(s) for which it receives funding.

The Governing Board recognizes that tobacco use presents serious health risks and desires to provide support and assistance in reducing the number of students who begin or continue to use tobacco. The Superintendent or designee shall establish a comprehensive program that includes consistent enforcement of laws prohibiting tobacco possession and use by students, tobacco-use prevention education, and intervention and cessation activities and/or referrals.

Prohibition Against Tobacco Use

Note: Pursuant to Penal Code 308, persons under age 18 years are prohibited from possessing tobacco. Education Code 48900 and 48901 prohibit students from smoking or using tobacco on school grounds, as provided in the following paragraph. Pursuant to Education Code 48900, students who violate this prohibition may be subject to suspension or expulsion; see AR 5144.1 - Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process.

In addition, Health and Safety Code 104420 mandates that any district receiving funding through the state's TUPE program adopt and enforce a tobacco-free campus policy which prohibits the use of tobacco products in district buildings, on district property, and in district vehicles by anyone at any time; see BP 3513.3 - Tobacco-Free Schools for language implementing this mandate.

Students shall not smoke or use tobacco, or any product containing tobacco or nicotine, while on campus, while attending school-sponsored activities, or while under the supervision and control of district employees. This prohibition does not include students' possession or use of their own prescription products. (Education Code 48900, 48901)

The district may fulfill these requirements through either the direct provision of services or through referrals to available services. See the accompanying administrative regulation.

The CDE defines "intervention programs" as programs used to provide further intensive education as an alternative to suspension for tobacco possession.

The district may provide or refer students to counseling, intensive education, and other intervention services to assist in the cessation of tobacco use.

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Prevention Instruction

Note: The following optional section may be revised to reflect district practice and the grade levels offered by the district. Education Code 51202 requires the district to offer a course of study at the appropriate elementary and secondary grade levels that includes the effects of tobacco (and other drugs and alcohol) upon the human body. Education Code 51202 also requires that the course of study in secondary grades include instruction on the effects of tobacco upon prenatal development. See AR 6143 - Courses of Study. The state's content standards for health education include a number of standards at selected grades from K-12 related to the health consequences of tobacco use.

The TUPE program provides resources for supplemental instruction in grades 6-12 that address specified topics; see the accompanying administrative regulation. The CDE's Guidelines for Tobacco Prevention, contained in its Getting Results publication, recommend developmentally appropriate instruction in grades K-12, with instruction that is especially intensive in grades 6-9 (particularly the transition year from elementary to middle school/junior high) and is reinforced in high school.

The district shall provide developmentally appropriate tobacco-use prevention instruction for students at selected grade levels from K-12. Such instruction shall be aligned with state content standards and the state curriculum framework for health education and with any requirements of state and/or federal grant programs in which the district participates.

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Program Planning

Note: The following optional section may be revised to reflect district practice. Health and Safety Code 104420 and 104435 require districts receiving TUPE funds, with assistance from the county office of education, to coordinate efforts with the "lead local agency" in the community, defined in Health and Safety Code 104400 as the county or city health department. Health and Safety Code 104420 also gives priority for funding to districts that design their projects to coordinate with other community services. According to the CDE, districts should work with a broad-based advisory council in the development of the TUPE grant application. This advisory body may be a regional council or district council and may be the same advisory council used to receive input for multiple district projects.

For districts participating in the federal SDFSC program, 20 USC 7114 requires ongoing consultation with specified stakeholders.

The Superintendent or designee shall coordinate with the local health department and county office of education in program planning and implementation. He/she may establish an advisory council including students, parents/guardians, district staff, representatives of the local health department and community organizations, law enforcement professionals, and/or others with demonstrated expertise in tobacco prevention and cessation.

The district's program shall be aligned with guidelines issued by the California Department of Education (CDE) and with federal Principles of Effectiveness described in 20 USC 7115. The Superintendent or designee shall:

1. Base the district's program on a thorough assessment of objective data regarding tobacco-use problems in district schools and the community

This assessment shall include an analysis of data regarding the incidence and consequences of tobacco use, an examination of existing efforts and activities in the community, and a determination of high-priority groups that are most in need of district services.

2. Establish a set of measurable goals and objectives and design the program to meet those goals and objectives

Note: The federal Principles of Effectiveness require programs to be based on scientifically based research, as provided in item #3 below. Pursuant to Health and Safety Code 104420, programs funded by TUPE must be based on model program design(s) approved by the CDE. Approved programs are those designated as "research validated" on the California Healthy Kids Resource Center's web site.

- 3. Design and implement the program based on scientific research or evaluation that provides evidence that the strategies will prevent or reduce tobacco use
- 4. Use the results of ongoing program evaluations to strengthen the program and refine program goals and objectives

Program Evaluation

Note: The following optional section may be revised to reflect district practice. According to the CDE, districts that accept TUPE funds are required to administer the core California Healthy Kids Survey in the first year of funding and at least every other year thereafter to assess the health-related behavior of a representative sample of students in grades 7, 9, and 11. In addition, districts that receive funding through either TUPE or SDFSC are required to complete the Safe and Healthy Kids Annual Report by June 30 of each year.

Randomly selected grantees and schools participate in the California Student Tobacco Survey biennially administered by the California Department of Public Health. In 88 Ops.Cal.Atty.Gen. 8, the Attorney General opined that districts are required to participate in evaluations of their tobacco-use prevention programs as a condition of receiving funds and that the CDE must withhold funds from any district that refuses to participate in evaluations conducted by the Department of Public Health.

To evaluate the effectiveness of the district's program and ensure accountability, the Superintendent or designee shall biennially administer the California Healthy Kids Survey to students at selected grade levels in order to assess student attitudes toward tobacco and student use of tobacco. He/she also shall annually report to the Board and the CDE on program activities, program expenditures, the number of individuals receiving each type of service or training, progress toward program goals and objectives, and other data required pursuant to Health and Safety Code 104450.

TOBACCO

Tobacco-Use Prevention Education Program

Note: The following optional administrative regulation reflects requirements of the state's Tobacco-Use Prevention Education (TUPE) program pursuant to Health and Safety Code 104350-104495 and may be adapted by other districts that do not receive TUPE funding.

Effective July 1, 2009, the TUPE program provides competitive grant funding for local programs targeting students in grades 6-12. The district may modify the following administrative regulation to reflect the grades at which the district's program is offered.

The district's tobacco-use prevention program shall provide students in grades 6-12 instruction which addresses the following topics: (Health and Safety Code 104420)

- 1. Immediate and long-term undesirable physiologic, cosmetic, and social consequences of tobacco use
- 2. Reasons that adolescents say they smoke or use tobacco
- 3. Peer norms and social influences that promote tobacco use
- 4. Refusal skills for resisting social influences that promote tobacco use

(cf. 6142.8 - Comprehensive Health Education)
(cf. 6143 - Courses of Study)
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Note: Health and Safety Code 104420 requires local TUPE programs to provide access to intervention and cessation services to high-risk groups in grades 7-12. The California Department of Education (CDE) has determined that these services should be directed toward current users and should be voluntary for students. The CDE's TUPE program application clarifies that districts are not required to directly provide the services, but may instead refer students to community services to satisfy this requirement.

As appropriate, the district shall provide or refer students in grades 7-12 to tobacco-use intervention and cessation activities. (Health and Safety Code 104420)

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These services shall be directed toward current users and shall be voluntary for students who desire assistance in ceasing the use of tobacco.

Note: The following paragraph is optional. In addition to targeting current tobacco users, Health and Safety Code 104420 requires the CDE to give funding priority to programs that target students most at risk for beginning to use tobacco. Student populations considered to be "most at risk" are to be identified by the district through a local needs assessment; see the accompanying Board policy. On the TUPE application, the district must provide a description of the student population and the district's rationale for designating that population as "high risk." Examples of "high-risk" populations may include students whose parents/guardians smoke, students transitioning from one educational setting to another (e.g., middle school to high school), or students in continuation education or other nontraditional education settings.

In addition to targeting students who currently use tobacco, the district's program shall target students most at risk for beginning to use tobacco as identified through a local needs assessment.

Note: Health and Safety Code 104460 requires districts receiving TUPE funds to provide access to tobaccouse prevention and intervention services to pregnant and parenting students, as provided below. The TUPE application clarifies that districts are not required to directly provide the following services, but may instead refer students to community services.

The district shall provide or refer every pregnant and parenting minor enrolled in the district to tobacco-use prevention services. Such services may be integrated with existing programs for pregnant and parenting minors and shall include: (Health and Safety Code 104460)

- 1. Referral to perinatal and related support services
- 2. Outreach services and assessment of smoking status
- 3. Individualized counseling and advocacy services
- 4. Motivational messages
- 5. Cessation services, if appropriate
- 6. Incentives to maintain a healthy lifestyle
- 7. Follow-up assessment
- 8. Maintenance and relapse prevention services

HATE-MOTIVATED BEHAVIOR

Note: The following optional policy is for use by districts in the implementation of a prevention strategy for hate-motivated incidents and should be modified to reflect district practice. Elements of this policy will also likely be integrated into existing school plans, such as school safety and staff development plans, as well as any policies developed by the district regarding school climate (see BP 5137 - Positive School Climate) and nondiscrimination (see BP 0410 - Nondiscrimination in District Programs and Activities and BP 5145.3 - Nondiscrimination/Harassment).

In its publication entitled <u>Hate-Motivated Behavior in Schools</u>, the California Department of Education defines "hate-motivated behavior" as an act, or attempted act, motivated by hostility towards a victim's real or perceived ethnicity, national origin, immigrant status, sex, gender, sexual orientation, religious belief, age, disability, or any other physical or cultural characteristic. Some "hate-motivated behavior," including an assault, bomb threat, destruction of property, graffiti, and certain types of vandalism, may also be crimes under state or federal law.

In order to create a safe learning environment for all students, the Governing Board desires to protect the right of every student to be free from hate-motivated behavior and will promote harmonious relationships among students so as to enable them to gain a true understanding of the civil rights and social responsibilities of people in society. The district prohibits discriminatory behavior or statements that degrade an individual on the basis of his/her actual or perceived race, ethnicity, culture, heritage, gender, sex, sexual orientation, physical/mental attributes, or religious beliefs or practices.

The Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with regional programs and community organizations to promote safe environments for youth. These efforts shall be focused on providing an efficient use of district and community resources.

Grievance Procedures

Note: School-level grievance procedures for investigation of sexual harassment complaints are detailed in AR 5145.7 - Sexual Harassment. The following paragraph provides for the application of those procedures to the investigation of complaints regarding hate-motivated behavior. Districts that wish to use other procedures should modify the following paragraph accordingly.

Any student who believes he/she is a victim of hate-motivated behavior shall immediately contact the Coordinator for Nondiscrimination/Principal. Upon receiving such a complaint, the Coordinator/Principal shall immediately investigate the complaint in accordance with school-level complaint process/grievance procedures as described in AR 5145.7 - Sexual Harassment. A student who has been found to have demonstrated hate-motivated behavior shall be subject to discipline in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

Board Policy

Hate-Motivated Behavior

BP 5145.9 Students

The Governing Board affirms the right of every student to be protected from hate-motivated behavior. It is the intent of the Board to promote harmonious relationships that enable students to gain a true understanding of the civil rights and social responsibilities of people in our society. Behavior or statements that degrade an individual on the basis of his/her race, ethnicity, culture, heritage, gender, sexual orientation, physical/mental attributes, religious beliefs or practices shall not be tolerated.

Any student who feels that he/she is a victim of hate-motivated behavior shall immediately contact the principal or designee. If the student believes that the situation has not been remedied by the principal or designee, he/she may file a complaint in accordance with district complaint procedures.

Staff who receive notice of hate-motivated behavior or personally observe such behavior shall notify the principal, Superintendent or designee, and law enforcement, as appropriate. Students demonstrating hate-motivated behavior shall be subject to discipline in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation.

In addition, the district shall provide counseling and appropriate sensitivity training and

diversity education for students exhibiting hate-motivated behavior. The district shall also provide counseling, guidance and support, as necessary, to those students who are the victims of hate-motivated behavior.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that staff receive appropriate training to recognize hate-motivated behavior and methods for handling such behavior in appropriate ways.

ACADEMIC STANDARDS

Note: The following optional policy may be revised to reflect district practice.

Education Code 60605-60605.5 require the State Board of Education (SBE) to adopt statewide standards in specified core subject areas and authorize the SBE to adopt model standards in other subject areas. Statewide standards serve as the basis for the state's curriculum frameworks and state assessment of core curriculum areas. To date, the SBE has adopted content standards for English language arts, English language development, mathematics, science, health education, history-social science, physical education, visual and performing arts, world languages, and career technical education. Voluntary "preschool learning foundations," which describe the knowledge, skills, and competencies that children are expected to exhibit as they complete their first or second year of preschool, are under the jurisdiction of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction rather than the SBE; see BP 5148.3 - Preschool/Early Childhood Education.

Although the state standards are "models" rather than mandates, it is expected that districts will develop local standards that meet or exceed the state standards. In addition, districts may choose to adopt content standards in other subjects that are not addressed in the state standards.

The Governing Board shall adopt high academic standards for student achievement which challenge all students to reach their full potential and which clarify what students are expected to know and be able to do at each grade level and in each area of study.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide the Board with recommended standards. In developing these recommended standards, the Superintendent or designee shall use a process that involves teachers, school site and district administrators, students, parents/guardians, and community members. He/she shall ensure the alignment of the standards with the district's vision and goals and ensure the proper articulation of standards between grade levels.

District standards for English language arts, English language development, mathematics, science, health education, history-social science, physical education, visual and performing arts, world languages, career technical education, and preschool education shall meet or exceed statewide model content standards adopted by the State Board of Education or the State Superintendent of Public Instruction as applicable.

Teachers and school administrators shall receive professional development to ensure their understanding of the standards and to discuss effective instructional methods in preparing students to meet the standards.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually communicate the applicable standards to students and their parents/guardians to inform them of the expectations for student learning at their grade level.

Staff shall continually assess students' progress toward meeting the standards, report each student's progress to the student and his/her parents/guardians, and offer remedial assistance in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation.

Instruction

The Governing Board recognizes that content and performance standards are necessary to clarify for students, parents/guardians and staff what students are expected to know and be able to do at each grade level and in each area of study. The Board shall adopt high standards for student achievement that meet or exceed statewide standards and challenge all students to reach their full potential.

District standards shall be developed through a process that involves staff, students, parents/guardians and community members. Standards shall be based on a review of state model standards and an assessment of the skills that students will need in order to be successful in the workplace and in higher education, including basic skills, problem-solving abilities and conceptual thinking. Special care shall be taken to ensure the proper articulation of standards among district schools.

Staff shall continually assess students' progress toward meeting the standards and shall offer remedial assistance in accordance with Board policy. The standards shall also provide a basis for evaluating the instructional program, making decisions about curriculum and assessment, and, as required by law, evaluating teacher performance.

Board PolicyClassroom Interruptions

BP 6116
Instruction

The Governing Board recognizes that class time should be dedicated to student learning. The Board believes that classroom interruptions which are not related to the educational program should be kept at an absolute minimum.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish administrative regulations to govern classroom interruptions.

CLASSROOM INTERRUPTIONS

Note: The following optional administrative regulation may be revised to reflect district practice. Education Code 32212 expresses the Legislature's intent that all districts formally address the problem of classroom interruptions and adopt a policy to control them.

Also see related policies and administrative regulations addressing other forms of classroom interruptions, including students' use of cell phones and other mobile communications devices (BP 5131 - Conduct); employees' use of cell phones and other mobile communications devices (BP 4040 - Employee Use of Technology); and more serious disruptions of school operations caused by students (BP/AR 5131.4 - Student Disturbances) and nonstudents (BP/AR 3515.4 - Disruptions) which may threaten to disturb the peace, the health or safety of students or staff, or cause property damage.

In order to allow students to take full advantage of learning opportunities while in the classroom, school staff shall ensure that interruptions are kept to a minimum. Strategies to reduce classroom interruptions include, but are not limited to, the following:

- 1. Keep announcements made through intercom or public address systems to a minimum, limit announcements to specific times during the day, and only use the intercom or public address systems for announcements that apply to all students or groups of students. Announcements that apply to individual students or staff members should be distributed in writing.
- 2. Establish a fixed time for the delivery of written messages to students and staff, except in cases of emergencies.
- 3. Schedule school maintenance operations involving noise or classroom disruption, as well as deliveries of equipment and supplies, to classrooms before or after school hours whenever possible.

Note: Item #4 below addresses classroom interruptions caused by visitors. Also see BP/AR 1250 - Visitors/Outsiders, which specifies that individuals should arrange school visits with the teacher or principal in advance and that conferences with the teacher should be held during noninstructional time.

4. Inform school visitors that, whenever possible, they should make appointments in advance, in accordance with district policy.

5. Notify parents/guardians that they should go to the school office rather than the classroom when they are dropping off their child late, picking him/her up early, or bringing by any forgotten items from home.

RESPONSE TO INSTRUCTION AND INTERVENTION

Note: "Response to intervention" (RTI) is a strategy of organizing instruction and support resources in the general education program to help close the achievement gaps for all students, including students at risk, students with disabilities, and English language learners. In this strategy, a student who is suspected of having a learning disability or who is showing academic delays is provided intensive instruction and intervention for a specified period of time before the educational problems increase in intensity and special education seems the only viable option. During this period, the student's academic progress is frequently measured to see if the interventions are sufficient to help the student catch up with his/her peers. If the student fails to show significant progress, this failure to "respond to intervention" can be viewed as evidence of a specific learning disability, thus qualifying the student for evaluation of the need for special education services.

The California Department of Education (CDE) has expanded the term RTI to "response to instruction and intervention" (RtI²) to include the full spectrum of instruction to meet the academic and behavioral needs of students and as a method to reduce the disproportionate representation of certain subpopulations of students identified as needing special education. RtI² is consistent with the accountability goals of the No Child Left Behind Act (20 USC 6318, 6319) and the identification of students under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (20 USC 1400-1482). According to the CDE, RtI² integrates resources from general education, categorical programs, and special education into a comprehensive system of core instruction and interventions to benefit every student. As part of the state's Quality Assurance Process, the CDE will examine whether districts have a disproportionate representation of racial and ethnic groups in special education and related services that is the result of inappropriate identification.

The following policy is optional and should be modified to reflect district practice.

The Governing Board desires to provide a high-quality, data-driven educational program to meet the learning and behavioral needs of each student and to help reduce disparities in achievement among subgroups of students. Students who are not making academic progress pursuant to district measures of performance shall receive intensive instruction and intervention supports designed to meet their individual learning needs.

The district's RtI² system shall include research-based, standards-based, culturally relevant instruction for students in the general education program; universal screening and continuous classroom monitoring to determine students' needs and to identify those students who are not making progress; criteria for determining the types and levels of interventions to be provided; and subsequent monitoring of student progress to determine the effectiveness of the intervention and to make changes as needed.

When data from the RtI² system indicate that a student may have a specific learning disability, the student may be referred for evaluation for special education or other services.

Parents/guardians shall be kept informed of their child's progress and provided information regarding the services that will be provided, the strategies being used to increase the student's rate of learning, and information about the performance data that will be collected.

Board Policy Multicultural Education

BP 6141.6
Instruction

To foster intercultural understanding, communication and respect in an increasingly diverse society, curriculum and instruction at all grade levels shall reflect the perspective and experiences of various cultural, ethnic, racial and social groups. The Governing Board desires that multicultural education be integrated across the curriculum into as many subjects as possible rather than providing isolated lessons on different cultures.

The district's comprehensive multicultural education program shall recognize the contributions of different groups of people to the history, life and culture of the local community, California, the United States and other nations. It may include but not be limited to instruction about the languages, cultural characteristics, significant events and individuals, and social, political and economic conditions of various ethnic groups.

While recognizing the unique aspects of different cultures and peoples, multicultural education shall also emphasize commonalities and challenge the stereotypes and biases that inhibit intergroup understanding. Multicultural education also shall be designed to contribute to the personal development of students through greater self-understanding, positive self-concept and pride in one's ethnic identity.

HISTORY-SOCIAL SCIENCE INSTRUCTION

Note: The following optional policy may be revised to reflect district practice. Education Code 51210 and 51220 require that social studies be included in the course of study offered in grades 1-12, including age-appropriate instruction drawing upon the disciplines of anthropology, economics, geography, history, political science, psychology, and sociology. For specific topics that must be included in the history-social science curriculum, see BP 6143 - Courses of Study.

In addition, Education Code 51225.3 requires completion of three courses of social studies for high school graduation; see BP 6146.1 - High School Graduation Requirements.

The Governing Board believes that the study of history and other social sciences is essential to prepare students to engage in responsible citizenship, comprehend complex global interrelationships, and understand the vital connections among the past, present, and future. The district's history-social science education program shall be designed to develop students' knowledge of historical events within a chronological and geographic context and shall include, at appropriate grade levels, instruction in American and world history, geography, economics, political science, anthropology, psychology, and sociology.

Note: The State Board of Education (SBE) has adopted <u>History-Social Science Content Standards for California Public Schools</u> which covers grades K-12, with the exception of grade 9 which, in current California practice, is traditionally the year in which students choose a history-social science elective. In addition to core content knowledge, the standards describe intellectual reasoning, reflection, and research skills that should be learned through the content standards for grade ranges K-5, 6-8, and 9-12.

The Board shall adopt academic standards for history-social science which meet or exceed state content standards and describe the knowledge and skills that students shall be expected to achieve at each grade level.

Note: The SBE's <u>History-Social Science Framework for California Public Schools</u>, updated in 2005, reflects the state content standards and is organized into three broad categories of curricular goals, each with several "basic learnings" or curriculum strands, as provided in items #1-3 below.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop a comprehensive, sequential curriculum that is aligned with the district standards and is consistent with the state's curriculum framework. At each grade level, the curriculum shall integrate age-appropriate instruction designed to develop student achievement in the following areas:

- 1. Knowledge and cultural understanding, including historical, ethical, cultural, geographic, economic, and sociopolitical literacy
- 2. Democratic understanding and civic values, including an understanding of national identity; constitutional heritage; and an individual's civic values, rights, and responsibilities
- 3. Skills attainment and social participation, including basic study skills, critical thinking skills, and participation skills that are essential for effective citizenship

The district's history-social science curriculum shall include a multicultural education component which is designed to teach students to respect and appreciate cultural diversity and different points of view while also developing their understanding of commonalities and collective experiences. The curriculum shall reflect the experiences of men and women and of various cultural, ethnic, racial, religious, and social groups and their contributions to the history, life, and culture of the local community, California, the United States, and other nations.

Note: Instructional materials that will be used by the district must be adopted by the Governing Board in accordance with Education Code 60200-60206 for grades K-8 and Education Code 60400-60411 for grades 9-12.

Education Code 60119 requires the Board to hold a public hearing on the sufficiency of standards-aligned instructional materials in certain subjects, including history-social science; see BP 6161.1 - Selection and Evaluation of Instructional Materials. Also see BP 6161.1 for information about the Instructional Materials Funding Realignment Program (Education Code 60420-60424) which provides a block grant for instructional materials, with a priority on providing materials that are aligned to state standards in four core curriculum areas, including history-social science.

The state content standards for history-social science encourage schools to use supplementary materials as provided in the following paragraph.

The Board shall adopt standards-aligned instructional materials for history-social science in accordance with applicable law, Board policy, and administrative regulation. In addition, teachers are encouraged to supplement the curriculum through the use of biographies, original documents, diaries, letters, legends, speeches, other narrative artifacts, and literature from and about the period being studied.

Note: Education Code 99200-99206 establish the California History-Social Science Project, a statewide professional development project designed to develop and enhance teachers' knowledge and instructional strategies to improve student achievement in history-social science. Professional development resources also may be located through state and national professional associations, such as the California Council for the Social Studies or the National Council for History Education.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide a standards-based professional development program designed to increase teachers' knowledge of adopted instructional materials and instructional strategies for teaching history-social science.

Note: The following optional paragraph should be revised to reflect indictors that will be used to evaluate program effectiveness as agreed upon by the Board and Superintendent or designee. As part of the Standardized Testing and Reporting Program, Education Code 60642.5 requires the SBE to approve California Standards Tests in history-social science in at least one elementary or middle school grade level (currently grades 6 and 8) and in each of grades 9-11 (except currently not grade 9 because the SBE has not adopted content standards for grade 9 history-social science as noted above).

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly evaluate and report to the Board regarding the implementation and effectiveness of the history-social science curriculum at each grade level, including, but not limited to, the extent to which the program is aligned with state standards, test results from the Standardized Testing and Reporting Program at applicable grade levels, and feedback from students, parents/guardians, and staff regarding the program.

Students BP 5021(a)

NONCUSTODIAL PARENTS

Note: Family Code 3002 defines "joint custody" as joint legal and joint physical custody. Under a joint legal custody arrangement, both parents/guardians share the right and responsibility to make decisions relating to their child's health, education, and welfare. When one parent/guardian has "sole legal custody," then, pursuant to Family Code 3006, only that parent has the right to make such decisions for the child.

The Governing Board recognizes the right of parents/guardians to be involved in the education of their children and desires to balance that right with the district's need to ensure the safety of students while at school.

Note: Education Code 49069 provides that all parents/guardians, regardless of custody, have absolute access to a student's record. However, pursuant to Education Code 49061, a parent without legal custody does not have the right to challenge the content of a student record, provide a written response to the record, or consent to its release to third parties. See AR 5125 - Student Records. Only a parent/guardian as defined in Education Code 56028 is entitled to make educational decisions regarding a student with disabilities; see BP/AR 6159 - Individualized Education Program.

The parent/guardian who enrolls a child in a district school shall be presumed to be the child's custodial parent/guardian and shall be held responsible for the child's welfare.

School officials shall presume that both parents/guardians have equal rights regarding their child, including, but not limited to, picking the student up after school or otherwise removing the student from school, accessing student records, participating in school activities, or visiting the school. When a court order restricts access to the child or to his/her student information, a parent/guardian shall provide a copy of the certified court order to the principal or designee upon enrollment or upon a change in circumstances.

Note: A court order binds only the parties to the order, not the district or its staff. However, if school officials have been provided a certified copy of such a court order, then they have a responsibility to abide by any terms of the order applicable to situations arising at school. For example, if a court order conflicts with Education Code statutes that give noncustodial parents the right to access student records, the district should seek legal counsel to determine whether the court order or the statutes should prevail. If a court order restricts access to the child, it is recommended that staff contact the custodial parent and local law

NONCUSTODIAL PARENTS (continued)

enforcement officials in the event of an attempted violation of the order. If a court order restricting access to a child is not issued by a California court, staff should consult with legal counsel and local law enforcement officials to determine its validity.

In the event of an attempted violation of a court order that restricts access to a student, the principal or designee shall contact the custodial parent and local law enforcement officials and shall make the student available only after one or both of these parties consent.

Noncustodial Parents

BP 5021 Students

Noncustodial parents generally retain the same rights as custodial parents unless a court order restricts the rights of the noncustodial parent. These rights include but are not limited to accessing his/her child's student records, participating in school activities and visiting the child at school. If a completed or pending legal action curtails the noncustodial parent's rights, the parent/guardian with custody shall provide evidence of this action to the Superintendent or designee.

Upon request, the district shall provide noncustodial parents with announcements and notices that are sent to the custodial parent.

While both parents can visit the child at school, only the custodial parent has the right to remove the child from school property. Only a verified note or an emergency card from the custodial parent will be cause for exception to this provision.

In the event of an attempted violation of a court order that restricts access to a student, staff shall contact the custodial parent and local law enforcement officials and shall make the student available only after one or both of these parties consent.

SUICIDE PREVENTION

Note: The Government Claims Act (Government Code 810-996.6) provides that a district may be liable for injuries on school grounds or for an employee's failure to exercise supervisorial responsibility to use reasonable care to prevent foreseeable injuries resulting from school activities. Therefore, it is strongly recommended that, before adopting the following optional policy and administrative regulation, districts carefully review all the elements, consider their staff capabilities and resources, and delete or modify them as necessary to ensure that all aspects will be adequately enforced. Districts should also consult with legal counsel and the district's risk manager or insurance carrier, as appropriate.

The Governing Board recognizes that suicide is a major cause of death among youth and should be taken seriously. In order to attempt to reduce suicidal behavior and its impact on students and families, the Superintendent or designee shall develop preventive strategies and intervention procedures.

The Superintendent or designee may involve school health professionals, school counselors, administrators, other staff, parents/guardians, students, local health agencies and professionals, and community organizations in planning, implementing, and evaluating the district's strategies for suicide prevention and intervention.

Prevention and Instruction

Note: The following optional section may be revised to reflect district practice. The California Department of Education's (CDE) Youth Suicide-Prevention Guidelines for California Schools identifies factors that may help build resiliency and protect against high-risk behaviors, including, but not limited to, emotional wellness, school engagement, self-perceived ability to cope with problems, and positive interpersonal relationships. For further information about strategies to protect students from bullying, cyberbullying, and other harassment, see BP 5131 - Conduct, BP 5145.3 - Nondiscrimination/Harassment, and BP 5145.9 - Hate-Motivated Behavior.

Suicide prevention strategies may include, but not be limited to, efforts to promote a positive school climate that enhances students' feelings of connectedness with the school and is characterized by caring staff and harmonious interrelationships among students.

Note: The state's Health Education Content Standards for California Public Schools include voluntary content standards pertaining to mental, emotional, and social health at selected elementary and secondary grades and suicide prevention instruction at grade 7 or 8 and in high school. The district may revise the following **optional** paragraph to reflect grade levels offered by the district.

The district's comprehensive health education program shall promote the healthy mental, emotional, and social development of students including, but not limited to, the development of problem-solving skills, coping skills, and self-esteem. Suicide prevention instruction shall be incorporated into the health education curriculum in the secondary grades. Such instruction shall be aligned with state content standards and shall be designed to help students analyze signs of depression and self-destructive behaviors, including potential suicide, and to identify suicide prevention strategies.

The Superintendent or designee may offer parents/guardians education or information which describes the severity of the youth suicide problem, the district's suicide prevention curriculum, risk factors and warning signs of suicide, basic steps for helping suicidal youth, and/or school and community resources that can help youth in crisis.

Staff Development

Note: The following optional section may be revised to reflect district practice. Pursuant to Education Code 41533, as added by SB 1378 (Ch. 143, Statutes of 2008), a district that receives funding through the Professional Development Block Grant may use a portion of those funds to provide each teacher up to two hours of training in the prevention of youth suicide. Such training may occur during a regularly scheduled inservice training day. In addition, Education Code 49604 encourages each district to provide suicide prevention training to each middle, junior high, and high school counselor.

Staff development may include training about risk factors associated with suicide, as provided in item #1 below. Information about research on risk factors is available in the CDE's <u>Youth Suicide-Prevention Guidelines for California Schools</u> as well as through the California Department of Mental Health, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, American Association of Suicidology, and other health organizations.

Suicide prevention training for staff shall be designed to help staff identify and respond to students at risk of suicide. The training shall be offered under the direction of a district counselor/psychologist and/or in cooperation with one or more community mental health agencies and may include information on:

1. Research identifying risk factors, such as previous suicide attempt(s), history of depression or mental illness, substance use problems, family history of suicide or violence, feelings of isolation, interpersonal conflicts, a recent severe stressor or loss, family instability, and other factors

- 2. Warning signs that may indicate suicidal intentions, including changes in students' appearance, personality, or behavior
- 3. Research-based instructional strategies for teaching the suicide prevention curriculum and promoting mental and emotional health
- 4. School and community resources and services

Intervention

Note: The following optional section should be revised to reflect district practice. Education Code 49602, which requires confidentiality of information disclosed to a school counselor by students 12 years of age or older, specifically allows a counselor to disclose such information to the principal or parents/guardians of the student when he/she has reasonable cause to believe that disclosure is necessary to avert a clear and present danger to the student's health or safety. In addition, Education Code 49602 allows disclosure to psychotherapists, other health care providers, or the school nurse for the sole purpose of referring the student for treatment.

Whenever a staff member suspects or has knowledge of a student's suicidal intentions, he/she shall promptly notify the principal or school counselor. The principal or counselor shall then notify the student's parents/guardians as soon as possible and may refer the student to mental health resources in the school or community.

Students shall be encouraged to notify a teacher, principal, counselor, or other adult when they are experiencing thoughts of suicide or when they suspect or have knowledge of another student's suicidal intentions.

Whenever schools establish a peer counseling system to provide support for students, peer counselors shall complete the suicide prevention curriculum, including identification of the warning signs of suicidal behavior and referral of a suicidal student to appropriate adults.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish crisis intervention procedures to ensure student safety and appropriate communications in the event that a suicide occurs or an attempt is made on campus or at a school-sponsored activity.

Administrative Regulation

SUICIDE PREVENTION

Note: The Government Claims Act (Government Code 810-996.6) provides that a district may be liable for injuries on school grounds or for an employee's failure to exercise supervisorial responsibility to use reasonable care to prevent foreseeable injuries resulting from school activities. Therefore, it is strongly recommended that, before adopting the following optional policy and administrative regulation, districts carefully review all the elements, consider their staff capabilities and resources, and delete or modify them as necessary to ensure that all aspects will be adequately enforced. Districts should also consult with legal counsel and the district's risk manager or insurance carrier, as appropriate.

Instruction

Note: The following optional section reflects topics of instruction recommended by suicide prevention resources and is consistent with the state's Health Education Content Standards for California Public Schools, which include standards pertaining to suicide prevention instruction at grade 7 or 8 and high school.

At appropriate secondary grades, the district's suicide prevention instruction shall be designed to help students:

- 1. Identify and analyze signs of depression and self-destructive behaviors and understand how feelings of depression, loss, isolation, inadequacy, and anxiety can lead to thoughts of suicide
- 2. Identify alternatives to suicide and develop coping and resiliency skills
- 3. Learn to listen, be honest, share feelings, and get help when communicating with friends who show signs of suicidal intent
- 4. Identify trusted adults, school resources, and/or community crisis intervention resources where youth can get help and recognize that there is no stigma associated with seeking mental health, substance abuse, and/or suicide prevention services

Intervention

Note: The following optional section may be revised to reflect district practice. For additional information about steps that school personnel can take when a student threatens or attempts suicide, see the California Department of Education's <u>Youth Suicide-Prevention Guidelines for California Schools</u>.

When a suicide attempt or threat is reported, the principal or designee shall:

- 1. Ensure the student's physical safety by one of the following, as appropriate:
 - a. Securing immediate medical treatment if a suicide attempt has occurred
 - b. Securing law enforcement and/or other emergency assistance if a suicidal act is being actively threatened
 - c. Keeping the student under continuous adult supervision until the parent/guardian and/or appropriate support agent or agency can be contacted and has the opportunity to intervene

- 2. Designate specific individuals to be promptly contacted, including the school counselor, psychologist, nurse, superintendent, and/or the student's parent/guardian, and, as necessary, local law enforcement or mental health agencies
- 3. Document the incident in writing as soon as feasible

- 4. Follow up with the parent/guardian and student in a timely manner to provide referrals to appropriate services as needed
- 5. Provide access to counselors or other appropriate personnel to listen to and support students and staff who are directly or indirectly involved with the incident at the school
- 6. Provide an opportunity for all who respond to the incident to debrief, evaluate the effectiveness of the strategies used, and make recommendations for future actions

Note: The following optional paragraph may be revised to reflect district practice. Education Code 32280-32289 require schools to develop and implement comprehensive school safety plans; see BP/AR 0450 - Comprehensive Safety Plan. If the district's safety plan includes crisis intervention strategies, those strategies may encompass procedures that the district will use in the aftermath of a suicide or attempted suicide. Also see BP 6164.2 - Guidance/Counseling Services for policy language pertaining to crisis counseling.

In the event that a suicide occurs or is attempted on campus, the principal or designee shall follow the crisis intervention procedures contained in the school safety plan. After consultation with the Superintendent or designee and the student's parents/guardians about

facts that may be divulged in accordance with the laws governing confidentiality of student record information, the principal or designee may provide students, parents/guardians, and staff with information, counseling, and/or referrals to community agencies as needed. School staff may receive assistance from school counselors or other mental health professionals in determining how best to discuss the suicide or attempted suicide with students.

SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL PROGRAM

Note: The following optional policy may be revised to reflect district practice. Districts are encouraged to review CSBA's policy brief, <u>Safe Routes to School: Program and Policy Strategies for School Districts</u>, when developing policy on this topic. In addition, districts should consult legal counsel and/or the district's insurance provider regarding any potential liability issues.

Both state and federal grants are available to support local efforts to increase the number of students walking and bicycling to school and to make it safer for them to do so. The federal Safe Routes to Schools (SRTS) program supports both infrastructure and noninfrastructure projects and focuses on grades K-8 (23 USC 148). The state program, referred to as SR2S, provides funding to cities and counties for infrastructure projects in the vicinity of K-12 schools, with up to 10 percent expenditure allowable for noninfrastructure activities (Streets and Highways Code 2333.5). Funding for both federal and state programs is distributed through the California Department of Transportation's (Caltrans) Division of Local Assistance. Questions about program administration may be directed to the Caltrans regional coordinator.

Strategies to promote walking, bicycling, and other forms of active transport to school may be referenced in the district's school wellness policy, adopted pursuant to the federal Child Nutrition and Women, Infants and Children (WIC) Reauthorization Act of 2004 (42 USC 1751 Note), which is required to include goals for physical activity; see BP 5030 - Student Wellness. Strategies may also be included in the district's comprehensive safety plan adopted pursuant to Education Code 32282; see AR 0450 - Comprehensive Safety Plan.

The Governing Board recognizes that walking, bicycling, and other forms of active transport to school promote students' physical activity and reduce vehicle traffic and air pollution in the vicinity of schools. As part of the district's coordinated approach to supporting student wellness and safety and enhancing student learning, the Superintendent or designee shall develop and implement strategies to establish and promote safe routes to school program activities.

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The Superintendent or designee may identify a program coordinator or establish district and/or school site committees to oversee and coordinate related activities.

The Superintendent or designee may collaborate with local public works and public safety departments, transportation agencies, other city and county agencies, school staff, students, parents/guardians and parent organizations, health organizations, community organizations, and/or businesses in the development, implementation, and evaluation of strategies.

Strategies shall be based on the grade levels of the students and an assessment of the conditions and needs of each school and the surrounding neighborhoods.

Note: When local agencies partner together to apply for a state or federal grant, the city or county is generally the lead applicant for infrastructure funding. A school district may be named as the responsible agency for a federal grant if it partners with a city, county, or transportation agency. However, the district may collaborate to find funding sources and also may seek alternative funding sources for district projects and events that are not covered by a grant.

The Superintendent or designee shall explore the availability of grant funds and other sources of funding to support related projects and activities.

Note: The following optional paragraph may be revised to reflect indicators agreed upon by the Governing Board and Superintendent or designee to assess progress toward program goals. To assist with program evaluation, the National Center for Safe Routes to School (NCSRTS) has developed a standardized survey of parents/guardians' attitudes about allowing their child to walk or bicycle to school as well as student tally forms for recording the modes of travel that students use. NCSRTS recommends that a district use these forms both before and after implementation of a project in order to evaluate changes in attitudes and behaviors. NCSRTS also provides data analysis and report preparation of parent surveys and student tallies. Caltrans requires the use of these evaluation forms by grant recipients.

The Superintendent or designee shall may periodically report to the Board on the implementation of program activities and progress toward program goals. Such reports may include, but not be limited to, levels of participation in promotional and educational activities, survey results of parent/guardian attitudes about allowing their child to walk or bicycle to school, tallies of the numbers of students using various modes of travel to and from school and how these numbers have changed over time, records of student attendance and on-time arrival, and injury data within the school and/or district attendance boundaries.

SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL PROGRAM

Note: The following optional administrative regulation should be revised to reflect district practice. The strategies listed below are organized around the "five E's" (education, encouragement, enforcement, engineering, and evaluation) recommended for inclusion in all local programs by the U.S. Department of Transportation's Federal Highway Administration and the National Center for Safe Routes to School's online resource guide, the Safe Routes to School Guide.

District strategies to improve student safety along routes to school and to promote walking, bicycling, and other forms of active transport to school by students may include:

- 1. Education activities that promote safety and awareness, such as:
 - a. Instructing students about pedestrian, bicycle, and personal safety
 - b. Instructing students about the health and environmental benefits of walking, bicycling, and other forms of active transport to school

(cf. 3510 - Green School Operations) (cf. 5030 - Student Wellness) (cf. 6142.7 - Physical Education) (cf. 6142.8 - Comprehensive Health Education)

- c. Offering driver safety education to high school students, parents/guardians, and the community
- 2. Encouragement strategies designed to generate interest in active transport to school, such as:
 - a. Organizing or facilitating "walking school buses" and/or "bicycle trains" whereby students walk or bike to school in groups escorted by parents/guardians or other volunteers as needed
 - b. Organizing special events and activities, such as Walk or Bike to School Day, International Walk to School Month, or year-round competitions
 - c. Publicizing the district's efforts in order to build support of parents/guardians and the community, including providing information about the district's safe routes to school program in parent/guardian communications and in any notifications about transportation options

SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL PROGRAM (continued)

- 3. Enforcement strategies to deter unsafe behaviors of drivers, pedestrians, and bicyclists, such as:
 - a. Initiating or expanding crossing guard, student safety patrol, and/or parent/guardian safety patrol programs

- b. Partnering with local law enforcement to help ensure that traffic laws are obeyed in the vicinity of schools and to implement appropriate measures such as placement of speed feedback monitors, ticketing, and/or driver safety campaigns
- c. Monitoring to ensure that students who bicycle to school or who use skateboards, skates, or nonmotorized scooters wear helmets in accordance with Vehicle Code 21212
- 4. Engineering strategies that address the design, implementation, operation, and maintenance of traffic control devices or physical measures, such as:
 - a. Working with local government agencies, parents/guardians, school staff, and others as appropriate to gather data about environmental conditions and hazards along routes to school

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- b. Working with local government agencies to make operational and physical improvements that reduce or eliminate hazards, such as reducing motor vehicle traffic speeds in the area and establishing safer and fully accessible crosswalks, walkways, trails, and bikeways
- c. Assessing the adequacy, accessibility, and safety of bicycle parking at schools and making modifications as needed, such as increasing the number of or relocating bicycle racks and/or equipment storage areas
